

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The coronavirus pandemic is causing a lot of hardship for many of our friends and neighbors. Many HCPSS families have been impacted financially by the pandemic, and may be eligible now to receive benefits through the Free and Reduced Price Meals (FARMs) program. Qualifying families can take advantage of a wide range of additional resources and discounts, including testing fees, tuition, internet and more.

As someone who received free meals and other support as a child, I encourage all Howard County families who are experiencing economic stress to access these resources during this challenging time. Eligible families can benefit from significant cost savings each school year and we want to connect as many families as possible to these resources.

If you already participate in the FARMs program, you do not need to complete the application again until August for the 2020-21 school year when the income eligibility levels change.
