Dear Mr. JoelGallihue, Ms. Jennifer Bubenko, and members of the Attendance Area AdjustmentCommittee,

My nameis Keri Landry, and I am a resident of the Brampton Hills Community, polygons1098 and 98 (4705 Ribble Crt, Ellicott City, MD. 21043).

I am writing to express my concernand confusion over the more recently developed plans to move our community of Brampton Hills (polygons 1098 and 98) to Thunder Hill Elementary School for the 2013/2014 school year.

People in the community realize that the task of adjusting school districts in Howard County is an arduous process. It also sparks a great deal of emotion, because all parents are striving to do what is best for their children. The plan, however, also needs to be based on logic, the overall health and safety of all children, and should not just be a numbers game where our children are continually moved around like pawns on a chess board.

When the original 2012 Feasibility Study was presented, our community was to move from Waterloo to Worthington. This is a logical choice. The geographical breakdown of Brampton Hills is as follows:

# **Closest Schools (in order):**

- 1. Veterans
- 2. Worthington
- 3. Ilchester
- 4. Northfield
- 5. Rockburn
- Waterloo

For obvious reasons, this move made sense. It took us from the sixth closest school from our residence to the second closest. Based on the most recent plans, however, we are slated to move to Thunder Hill Elementary. This is the seventh closest school from our residence even further than our current districted school of Waterloo. Although I applaud the efforts of residents and the AAC who have worked together this summer to put together alternate plans, when Plan J was initiated, the impact on the Brampton Hills' Community (polygon 1098 and 98) was overlooked.

At this time I support the 2012 Feasibility Study which brought polygons 1098 ad 98 to Worthington, or adjusting plan ACC-L6 to move polygons 1098 and 98 from Thunder Hill to Worthington.

At the beginning of this process the committee was asked to review

several factors in assessing the reasonableness of moves within the county. The move of Brampton Hills to Thunder Hill contradicts the guiding principles of these factors, while the move to Worthington supports them.

• Educational Welfare of students in both the sending and receiving schools

Educational welfare of our children is predicated upon the social, physical, and emotional welfare of children. The current plan to move to Thunder Hill entails negative consequences such as longer bus rides each day for our children on major roads, which is a major safety concern. It also eliminates the opportunity for them to build a sense of community with neighboring children and residents.

The number one way that children thrive is by having parents involved in the school and building a strong community where both parent and child remain active. As we can all agree, this is crucial in the formative elementary years. Currently, parents in Brampton Hills already struggle with traveling a great distance to go to Waterloo. With these new alternatives, we are asked to start all over again at a neighborhood that is even farther from our homes.

A move to Worthington however, would: 1) help provide a sense of community by bringing our children closer to other area children attending that school, 2) promote a 'Healthy Howard' community initiative through more play time in closer neighborhoods and, 3) allow more parents to get involved in their school community due to the proximity of the location. Worthington's educational scores would also align nicely with Brampton Hills' current school, Waterloo.

# Impact on the number of students bused and the distance bused students travel

Moving students from polygon 1098 and 98 to Thunder Hill will increase travel time for students, which isalready needlessly lengthy due to the location of Waterloo and the roads needed to travel to get there from our community. Although on a polygon map it may appear that Thunder Hill is an option, our community does not have access to any other road other than route 103. Therefore, this map is a case of 'looks can be deceiving. The move to Thunder Hill will create added congestion on routes 103 and routes 104, which is already extremely busy during school busing hours.

A move to Worthington, however, reduces bus time for students allowing them the opportunity for moreproductive activities than commuting. It also addresses safety issues related to travel. It cuts out needless traffic on route 104, and also creates less traffic and travel at the intersection of 103 and 104 which can be dangerous at all hours of the day.

# Cost

Longer bus rides equal more mileage, more gas costs, more repair costs, needless congestion, etc, which a move to Thunder Hill would create. This type of daily travel also takes a toll on something more important than a checkbook;

our children. As many parents can personally attest commuting is not fun. Children should not have to deal with the rigors of commuting at 5-11 years of age, especially when travel to Worthington could alleviate these costs, and evereduce these costs from the current travel to Waterloo.

# Frequency with which students are redistricted

Every year, it appears that no oneknows where to move Brampton Hills. Ten years ago we were at Ilchester and currently we are at Waterloo. The 2012 Feasibility Study yielded we should be at Worthington, Plan J moved us to Thunder Hill, while a plan entitled Ich2 which was worked on after Plan J suggested that we move back to Ilchester. Now with plan ACC-L6 we are back at Thunder Hill. This indecisiveness and movement causes a great deal of consternation to parents, students, and as I can imagine the Area Adjustment Board. It also does not instill a great deal of confidence to residents in this overall process. Since the move to Thunder Hill is without merit and there are no other apparent reasons to move us there, it sets us up for a possible future redistricting in less than 5 years.

By instituting a move to Worthington, as the 2012 Feasibility Plan suggested, long term projections would not change substantially for Worthington over time. Brampton (1098, 98), is a well-established neighborhood with no new spots for rebuilding, therefore, changes for long range planning are negligible.

As I havementioned, I applaud the efforts of the committee. I do believe however, that the aforementioned reasons I have listed require consideration in Brampton Hills' (1098 and 98) move to Thunder Hill. Of course Brampton Hills residents could start moving other polygon numbers around to suit our own purposes, and present that plan to you, however, we don't presume to know the makeup of another neighborhood, just our own.

The last plan presented moved almost as many students as the original 2012 Feasibility plan. As everyone will agree if we are moving this many students in anyplan, it should be the right move and not just a shift in an excel spreadsheet

Thank you for your consideration of this matter. At all future AAC meetings, Brampton Hills residents will have a significant presence. Please look for our blue shirts.

I am writing to express my concern regarding this possible change. Glenmont is a very small community with less than 25 students going to each of the 3 public schools. Currently we are the ONLY group that leaves Thunder Hill Elementary to go to Ellicott Mills Middle; there were 9 students in my son's 5<sup>th</sup> grade class and 7 in my daughter's. It was a difficult 6th grade year for both of them because of leaving so many familiar faces. My daughter in particular had difficulty making friends because of the large groups from other elementary schools and it seemed that girls have a harder time allowing new girls into their established groups. Fortunately we are current walkers to Howard High school and the feeder group from EMMS to Howard is much larger.

This would create a flawed feeder system in that these students would be the ONLY OMMS students to feed to Howard. (and a feed of just 1.8 percent). Having seen my children maintain friendships that they have made from middle school (even now — two of my children are in college and still have these friendships) and knowing how incredibly important this developmental stage is in their lives causes me great concern.

Additionally, if the ultimate intent is to move these students from OMMS to Oakland Mills High School — the issue becomes them being unable to walk to school. All of my children have participated in extracurricular activities. This would dramatically impact the students ability to do so as they would not be walking to the school just up the road, but rather would likely have to forego this important part of their lives and academic enrichment. I would not want my kids crossing Rt. 175, and have them walk nearly 4 miles IF they wanted to participate in any extracurricular activities or after-school events.

I am sure that AAC members can appreciate the value — both financial and environmental — of maintaining walkers as walkers. I urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS or at any middle school that feeds to Howard High School.

Thank you very much for your service to our County and our school children by taking on this difficult and time consuming task of looking at how to best district our children. Your efforts are much appreciated.

It was announced at the last meeting on 8/7 that you may well begin discussing middle school redistricting at the meeting this Tuesday 8/14. In case you do, I thought it was important that I share my concerns about what is proposed for my community, Glenmont, which is comprised of polygons 65, 1065, and 2065.

Glenmont is slated to be redistricted from Ellicott Mills MS to Oakland Mills MS. This move makes no sense because OMMS has no other students that feed to Howard High School, and Glenmont is districted to HHS and walks to HHS. If our children were to go to OMMS, they would have an incredibly low feeder to HHS, less than 2%, which does not comply with redistricting policy guidelines and, more importantly, would be disastrous for our children during a critical stage of their development.

We have been told that if we are redistricted to OMMS, it would then make sense to redistrict us out of HHS to Oakland Mills HS. As I stated, we walk to HHS, and to take away the valuable benefits that being in close proximity to a school provides a community and, instead, to add the cost to the HCPSS budget of one or potentially 2 buses to get Glenmont kids to OMHS (our community averages around 12 students a year per grade, so there could well be years that we need 2 buses to transport the children from our small neighborhood), seems very misguided.

I appreciate that not every community in Howard County has the benefit of walking, which studies show result in increased participation in extracurricular activities; better health from walking before and after school; and, increased community involvement in school events like football games, concerts, plays etc. These benefits are so valuable, the County should not deny them to any child and community that can take advantage of them.

From a "green" perspective, it is frustrating to see the County propose to add additional buses for a

community within walking distance of a school. Further, HCPSS needs to absorb considerable costs in coming years from the transfer of retirement benefits from the State to the County and to think that HCPSS may chose to fund buses instead of teachers is very troubling.

I understand that there is overcrowding at EMMS and HHS. However, as stated, Glenmont is such a small community, our children don't even make up ½ a classroom of students in any given year. Thus, it is very difficult to see how redistricting our children will really affect overcrowding, especially long term. Instead, it will just create a feeder problem or make walkers into busers.

Thus, I strongly urge you to recommend that Glenmont not be redistricted out of EMMS. Or, if you do think Glenmont needs to move, please transfer us to a school that also feeds to HHS, like Bonnie Branch MS, so that we can continue to walk to HHS.

My name is Stephen Seliger and I live in Glenmont. The polygons for the Glenmont neighborhood are 65, 1065, and 2065.

I have 3 children that are or will be in the Howard County Public School System.

Right now, Glenmont students attend Thunder Hill Elementary (THES), Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and Howard High School (HHS). We are "walkers" to THES and HHS.

It is my understanding that you have been asked to advise the Office of School Planning and BOE about middle school redistricting for 2014. The current feasibility study has Glenmont being redistricting out of EMMS to Oakland Mills MS.

My two older children currently attend THES and walk almost every day. This really benefits them and I understand that, at the HS level, the benefits are even greater and more important, allowing children to be more involved in extracurricular activities and families to attend more HS events. I think that all children should be afforded these benefits and certainly should not be denied them if at all possible.

Redistricting Glenmont to OMMS raises serious problems because at OMMS Glenmont would be the only population of students going, or "feeding" to HHS. They would be a very small group, only 1.8%, which is unacceptably low. If Glenmont is redistricting, the result may well be that we are also redistricted to a different HS, and we would lose our walker status. This makes no sense.

The cost of buses when children can walk and the loss of the social benefits of being in close proximity to a school are prohibitive. I sincerely hope that you see redistricting us to a MS that does not feed to HHS is illogical.

Glenmont students currently attend Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and walk to Howard HS. The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) in 2014. Dear AAC members:

I'm a resident of the Glenmont neighborhood in Columbia, which is currently slated to be redistricted in 2013-14 from Ellicott Mills to Oakland Mills Middle School. While I understand the AAC's current focus is on elementary school redistricting, several of my neighbors who have been following this closely told me that at a recent AAC meeting it was announced that middle school redistricting will also be discussed, so I wanted to share my concerns with you.

I have three children who will be impacted by this decision. Under the current proposal, they would have to change schools after just one year of middle school - a disruption that I'm very concerned would impede their academic progress, especially for one of my boys (who is on the Autism Spectrum; he has been doing well with no services, only accommodations, for the past 3 years, but even a straightforward transition to middle school will be a challenge given some of his social deficits). Then 2 years later they would either be the only kids from OMMS to feed into Howard High School (to which they'd be able to walk and with which they are already familiar, but they'd be part of an exceptionally small feeder group) or have to take the bus to Oakland Mills High School (at considerable expense to the County, and contrary to HCPSS policies that promote walking for a host of great reasons).

I understand the many competing priorities you need to balance, and thank you very much for your service on the AAC. I urge you to let Glenmont kids keep continuity through the important school transitions they'll be making in the coming years by keeping them at EMMS and then letting them walk to Howard High School.

I am a resident of the Glenmont neighborhood (polygons 65, 1065, and 2065) in Columbia. I have attended two AAC meetings thus far this summer and am writing with regard to the proposed middle school redistributing of my neighborhood.

Glenmont students currently attend Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and walk to Howard High School. The current Feasibility Study would create a feeder problem by sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) - and they would then be the only OMMS students feeding to Howard. That is an incredibly small feed of only 1.8%, which contradicts HCPSS's Policy 6010 which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15%.

If Glenmont students were redistricted out of Howard HS to resolve the feeder problem, that would create a new problem of turning Glenmont students from walkers to bussers - a situation which AAC members have thus far clearly tried to avoid during the meetings that I have attended.

Glenmont is too small to have a noticeable impact on overcrowding at EMMS, yet (in some years) would be too large to fit into one bus to be transported to another high school. According to the HCPSS transportation office, each bus holds about 44 high school students.

As a Howard County taxpayer - and someone who tries to follow "green" practices - I am concerned about the financial and environmental costs of unnecessarily adding a bus (or two) to transport Glenmont students to another high school. Adding a bus (or two) to transport Glenmont students would mean sacrificing money for other essential items, such as a teacher's salary.

It is important to me that my neighborhood remains one that WALKS to Howard HS. Therefore, I ask that you keep Glenmont at EMMS, or at any middle school that feeds into Howard HS.

Thank you for volunteering the many hours and the careful thought that is asked of all AAC members. I have been genuinely impressed by the process at the meetings. Thank you also for considering my - and my neighbors' - concerns.

Dear Members of the BOE:

Thank you for taking the concerns of the Brampton Hills community into consideration during your recent AAC meeting. I feel revising the plan to move Brampton Hills students to Worthington Elementary instead of to Thunder Hill in 2013 is the right decision for the following reasons:

# Educational Welfare of students in both the sending and receiving schools

Educational welfare of our children is predicated upon the social, physical, and emotional welfare of children. The current plan to move to Thunder Hill entails negative consequences such as longer bus rides each day for our children on major roads, which is a major safety concern. It also eliminates the opportunity for them to build a sense of community with neighboring children and residents.

The number one way that children thrive is by having parents involved in the school and building a strong community where both parent and child remain active. As we can all agree, this is crucial in the formative elementary years. Currently, parents in Brampton Hills already struggle with traveling a great distance to go to Waterloo. With these new alternatives, we are asked to start all over again at a neighborhood that is even farther from our homes.

A move to Worthington however, would: 1) help provide a sense of community by bringing our children closer to other area children attending that school, 2) promote a 'Healthy Howard' community initiative through more play time in closer neighborhoods and, 3) allow more parents to get involved in their school community due to the proximity of the location. Worthington's educational scores would also align nicely with Brampton Hills' current school, Waterloo.

### • Impact on the number of students bused and the distance bused students travel

Moving students from polygon 1098 and 98 to Thunder Hill will increase travel time for students, which is already needlessly lengthy due to the location of Waterloo and the roads needed to travel to get there from our community. Although on a polygon map it may appear that Thunder Hill is an option, our community does not have access to any other road other than route 103. Therefore, this map is a case of 'looks can be deceiving.' The move to Thunder Hill will create added congestion on routes 103 and routes 104, which is already extremely busy during school busing hours.

A move to Worthington, however, reduces bus time for students allowing them the opportunity for more productive activities than commuting. It also addresses safety issues related to travel. It cuts out needless traffic on route 104, and also creates less traffic and travel at the intersection of 103 and 104 which can be dangerous at all hours of the day.

#### Cost

Longer bus rides equal more mileage, more gas costs, more repair costs, needless congestion, etc., which a move to Thunder Hill would create. This type of daily travel also takes a toll on something more important than a checkbook; our children. As many parents can personally attest commuting is not fun. Children should not have to deal with the rigors of commuting at 5-11 years of age, especially when travel to Worthington could alleviate these costs, and even reduce these costs from the current travel to Waterloo.

# • Frequency with which students are redistricted

Every year, it appears that no one knows where to move Brampton Hills. Ten years ago we were at Ilchester and currently we are at Waterloo. The 2012 Feasibility Study yielded we should be at Worthington, Plan J moved us to Thunder Hill, while a plan entitled Ich2 which was worked on after Plan J suggested that we move back to Ilchester. Now with plan ACC-L6 we are back at Thunder Hill. This indecisiveness and movement causes a great deal of consternation to parents, students, and as I can imagine the Area Adjustment Board. It also does not instill a great deal of confidence to residents in this overall process. Since the move to Thunder Hill is without merit and there are no other apparent reasons to move us there, it sets us up for a possible future redistricting in less than 5 years.

Dear Members of the Attendance Area Committee:

My name is Gregory Ducot and I live in the neighborhood of Glenmont, Columbia. I am writing to provide feedback about the proposed redistricting of my neighborhood. I have two school-aged daughters, who will be negatively impacted by these rediscricting plans.

As you know, Glenmont students currently attend Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and walk to Howard High School (HHS). The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) in 2014. This proposal would, however, create a feeder problem because Glenmont students would be the only OMMS students to feed to HHS—a feed of only 1.8%. That would be a notably small feed at an incredibly important developmental stage in our children's lives. Plus, it would contradict HCPSS's Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15%.

As with many of my neighbors, I am also concerned that if Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they might then be redistricted out of HHS to resolve the feeder problem. I know that AAC members appreciate the value—both financial and environmental—of maintaining walkers as walkers, and it is critically important to me that my neighborhood remains one that walks to HHS. Therefore, I strongly urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS or, if necessary, at another middle school that feeds to HHS.

A number of Glenmont residents, whose children would be directly impacted by this critical redistricting question, have assembled a list of additional thoughts to support our concern. I am including these in my message to help stress why I feel it is critical to maintain the current districting arrangement (EEMS => HHS). Admittedly, some of these concerns are universal truths, but, nonetheless, they add to my conviction that redistricting is not good for Glenmont:

- 1) The middle-to-high school transition is emotionally demanding and with a small feed (1.8%) from OMMS to HHS, our children would have fewer middle school chums to count on for this transition;
- 2) Redistricting children partway through middle school can negatively impact a child (emotionally, psychological, socially) and cause undue stress on a child's life;
- 3) With the current EEMS to HHS plan, Glenmont benefits from having its high school students walk to school. We do not want to lose the health benefits of, what amounts to, about 40 minutes of walking each day;
- 4) By living close to home and having the opportunity to walk, Glenmont high schoolers tend to be more engaged in the HHS community and participate in extracurricular activities at school;
- 5) Realistically, the overall impact of redistricting Glenmont on the overcrowding at EMMS will be minimal, yet (in a few years) this same group will be too large to fit into one bus to be transported to another high school. According to the HCPSS transportation office, each bus holds about 44 high school students.
- 6) Glenmont residents are committed to minimizing our carbon footprint, so sending our high schoolers to a

"non-walkable" option would require an additional school bus in circulation to transport our high schoolers away from their current "walkable" option (HHS);

- 7) And, the financial cost of adding a bus (or two) to transport Glenmont students to another high school would, potentially, mean sacrificing money for other essential items, such as a teacher's salary;
- 8) In addition, sending our high schoolers to a "non-walkable" option would undoubtedly put more teenagers on the road. Statistics show that motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for U.S. teens. Crash risk is particularly high during the first year that teenagers are eligible to drive. An AAA study shows that after-school hours can be as deadly for teenage drivers as weekend nights;
- 9) And, the presence of teenage passengers increases the crash risk of teen drivers. Having the option to walk to and from school reduces the number of teenagers needing to catch rides with friends;
- 10) Glenmont residents can often hear the marching band practicing in the mornings and performing on Friday nights. This is a critical connection, which creates a sense of community and reminds us to support our neighborhood high school sports teams. We would lose this sense of community if we were redistricted to a high away that is far away;
- 11) Glenmont residents of all ages attend Howard High sporting events, musicals, pasta nights, etc., making all of us members of the Howard High community. We want to continue this relationship.

# In summary:

- \* If Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they would be the only students who feed to HHS;
- \* Glenmont students should remain at HHS since they are walkers;
- \* Therefore, Glenmont students should attend a middle school that feeds to HHS.

I live in the Glenmont neighborhood of Columbia and am writing to express my concern about the proposed school redistricting of Glenmont.

Glenmont students currently attend Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and walk to Howard High School. The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) beginning with the 2014 school year. This proposal would create a feeder problem because Glenmont students would be the only OMMS students to feed to Howard High School—a feed of only 1.8 percent. The proposal violates HCPSS's Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15 percent.

That HCPSS has contrived a proposal which violates its own policy (6010) by creating a feed that is only about one-tenth of what its own policy requires demonstrates a clear lack of regard for its own policies and calls into question the integrity of the decision making process, which should rely on established policies, laws, and precedents. That this proposal violates a written and well-established policy demonstrates a clear lack of regard for these ideas and displays unwillingness on behalf of officials to uphold the policies they have sworn to uphold. The recommendation of 15 percent feeds set forth in Policy 6010 was put in place for a reason, that is to prevent all of the problems that are inherent with smaller feeds, in this case, a substantially smaller feed. The move of Glenmont students creates more problems than it resolves and willfully violates a policy that clearly considered the detrimental impact that small moves, like 1.8 percent have on children, neighborhoods and communities.

I am also concerned that if Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they might likewise be redistricted away from Howard High School, a school to which students in Glenmont have always walked, to resolve the feeder problem. Being bused across the county to a high school when one is within walking distance of Glenmont simply defies any logical though process.

Accordingly, for all of the foregoing reasons, I urge the ACC to do what it has sworn to do, namely, to follow the policies by which it is bound and which members have sworn to uphold, to do otherwise calls into question the entire decision making process, displays a lack of regard for establish policies, and provides no clear precedent for future decisions. A perceived quick fix is not the appropriate way forward. Do what is right and what you have sworn to do, keep Glenmont at EMMS

Kids are wonderfully resilient and my issue is NOT that my kids will have to make new friends or meet new teachers or function in a new environment. I am very unhappy about the idea that our neighborhood school would be split apart. We chose this neighborhood in part because it had the benefit of a neighborhood school.

You only need to walk the sidewalks of our neighborhood to see that we live in a very close-knit community. We share in a community pool, a community playground, and community tennis courts. Every time we go to the neighborhood pool, my daughters see many friends and classmates and adults they know and trust. We have a community daycare center and recreational activities such as the dance studio and karate center. We have neighborhood events such as movie nights by the pool and ice cream socials. To Whom it May Concern,

My wife and I moved to the Worthington community in 2009. Our decision hinged in no small part because of the excellent school in the neighborhood. We understood that school districts move around from time to time, but we felt confident that because our new home was only a half-mile away from the school and in the same contiguous neighborhood that there was no way we would ever be redistricted out. It is very distressing to learn that this is now being considered -- again as it turns out. In 2010 we attended a meeting at WES at which redistricting was being discussed. The gentleman representing the County assured everyone that many factors went into drawing district line and keeping neighborhoods intacted was a priority. As the meeting went on, however, it became clear that the proposed new lines - the ones you are considering again, I believe - were drawn only to make the projected school population numbers come out right without any consideration whatever for neighborhood integrity. The largest financial decision of our lives held no sway at all. Our daily walks often take us to Worthington Elementary School. We interact with our neighbors regularly and feel we have become a part of the community here. There is no practical way we could have the same kind of relationship in another district.

If you need to cut from our district, the only reasonable choices lie in the periphery: New Cut Rd., College Ave., and Stone Hill Dr. If you want to gut our community, why does it make more sense to disect the original neighborhood than to parcel off the newer, higher density sections of Four Quarters Rd., High Castle Rd., and the back half of Doncaster Dr.? If last time is any indication, these choices haven't even been considered because you've already drawn lines that make the number come out just as you want them. Life, and school districts, should be about more than numbers. The Worthington neighborhood should go to Worthington Elementary because we are a community and have been since the 1960's. If that means our school will be a little too crowded, or not crowded enough for the County's tastes, then so be it. I intend to keep a close eye on this round of redistricting and I will make sure my entire neighborhood remembers the outcome at election time.

I am an eight-year resident, with two small children, living in the Glenmont neighborhood in Columbia. I am writing to express our concerns about the proposed redistricting of my neighborhood – in particular, the possibility of middle school redistricting.

Glenmont students currently attend Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and *walk* to Howard HS. The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) in 2014. This proposal would, however, create a feeder problem because Glenmont students would be the only OMMS students to feed to Howard HS—*a feed of only 1.8 percent*. That would be an incredibly small feed at an incredibly important developmental stage in our childrens' lives. Plus, it would contradict HCPSS's Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15 percent.

I am also concerned that if Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they might then be redistricted out of Howard HS to resolve the feeder problem.

Importance of	Walking:

I know that the Board of Education and AAC members place value on maintaining walkers as walkers – and it is equally, if not more, important to us, as a family, that our neighborhood remains one that **walks** to Howard HS. To highlight the importance of walking to us, I wanted to mention that since kindergarten, I have walked both of my children, every Wednesday, no matter what the weather, to Thunder Hill Elementary – a one-way .75-mile walk. More often than not, I will walk

them to school twice a week. I gladly do this because I believe that this will help promote lifelong health benefits for them, as well as an appreciation for burning calories as an alternative to burning petroleum.

Importance of After-School Activities and Athletics:	

In addition, my wife and I are lifelong runners and have gotten our children involved in running and general athletics, as well. Ensuring that our children remain districted to Howard HS will also tremendously aid them in their ability to stay late to participate in after school athletic and academic programs. Instead of taking the bus, or driving a car, or arranging alternate transportation to get home from extracurricular activities, as Howard HS students, they would merely just walk straight home.

My Request:

Therefore, I urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS or at any middle school that feeds to Howard HS.

I understand that the Howard County School District committee discussed various options for redistricting the geographic areas that attend Worthington Elementary School at its July 2012 meeting. Although I did not attend the meeting, I understand some of the discussion centered around possibly moving parts of the current Worthington Elementary school community to other schools. Apparently, it is now possible that portions of Taylor Village, the neighborhood where I live, may be impacted.

Please keep the Worthington community intact. Our neighborhood was built on the premise that we could eat, shop, play and go to school with our neighbors. Dividing our children into different schools completely defeats the purpose of neighborhoods like ours - high density, small parcel living which is designed to feel like a neighborhood where you know your neighbors and see them regularly. That would be an incredibly small feed at an incredibly important developmental stage in our childrens' lives. Plus, it would contradict HCPSS's Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15 percent. This happened to my daughter in the latest redistricting--she was redistricted in middle school with only 3 friends from Glenmont changing schools--this makes no sense at such a vulnerable stage of life. If you are going to redistrict---why not redistrict large neighborhoods so children can succeed in their friendships and social lives?

I am also concerned that if Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they might then be redistricted out of Howard HS to resolve the feeder problem. AAC members clearly appreciate the value—both the financial and environmental value—of maintaining walkers as walkers, and it is critically important to me that my neighborhood remains one that *walks* to Howard HS. <u>I can't even believe this is being discussed--in the</u> current economic crisis--you would add 1/2 full buses to redistrict our tiny neighborhood when they can walk to Howard High School? Again --why not redistrict a neighborhood that is already being bused and not add to the taxpayer burden?

Therefore, I urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS or at any middle school that feeds to Howard HS.

Although I recognize that the primary focus of the 2012 AAC is on elementary school redistricting, I am contacting you because of indications that the AAC intends to discuss middle school redistricting at your final meetings. Thus, this seems like an appropriate time to share my concerns about the proposed redistricting of Glenmont. Dear Ms Bubenko:

I'm writing to voice my opposition to the proposed redistricting plans for the 2013 school year. Specifically, the movement of polygon 6169 from Waverly Elementary to West Friendship Elementary.

To provide some background, the 6169 polygon is almost entirely composed of 55 and up housing; for reasons which I don't understand our group of 50 or so townhomes, known as Crescent Moon Court, was placed in this area. We are not age restricted. As I understand it, no other non age restricted parts of the Waverly Woods Community were placed in 6169, just us. As a result the 6169 polygon has between 20 and 30 elementary aged children, all of whom reside in Crescent Moon Court. Three of which will be fifth graders in 2013. I believe we would be better placed in the section of townhomes which abuts our community and is less than a hundred feet away.

I, My wife, and son reside at 2017 Crescent Moon Court. Crescent Moon Court is part of the Waverly Woods Community. We have lived at 2017 Crescent Moon for over four years. Our son, Max, has attended Waverly Elementary since Kindergarten. He will attend fourth grade this year and will be in fifth grade in 2013. Our son is an only child, his friends and the relationships formed over the past five years all center around Waverly Elementary. Not having brothers or sisters, his friends are everything to him. He will be devastated if he has to attend another school for his final year of elementary school.

Substantive reasons why redistricting 6169 does not make sense:

1. An increase in busing costs. Currently Crescent Moon Court is serviced by one bus which also serves the townhome section which abuts our group of homes but is not in

- 6169. If 6169 is moved to West Friendship not only will two buses have to serve the same area but the bus going to West Friendship will have to travel over five miles one way as compared the bus going to Waverly which travels approximately a mile.
- 2. Waverly Elementary is scheduled to have an addition completed by 2016. As a result of the increased capacity, it's proposed that children from Manor Woods Elementary will be moved to Waverly. Presumably, if 6169 is moved to West Friendship in 2013, it will be moved back to Waverly in 2016. Please note that Manor Woods Elementary is between Waverly and West Friendship. In fact, to reach West Friendship you have to drive by Manor Woods. In my opinion it's completely unfair to ask 6169 to move in 2013 and then move back in 2016. Conversely, if 6169 is not asked to move back to Waverly you would have a situation where children from Manor Woods were being bused to Waverly and the Waverly 6169 kids were being bused to West Friendship. Obviously this does not make sense. Isn't there a way to keep 6169 at Waverly? As mentioned above 6169 has only 20 to 30 elementary aged children. Can the number of children coming from St. Johns Lane be reduced by 20 to 30 kids? Can the number of kids coming from Veteren's to St. Johns Lane be reduced by 20 to 30 kids? Can a few portable classrooms be installed at Waverly for a few years?
- 3. From attending the planning meeting on August 7, 2012 I learned that the planners try to keep communities together. The 6169 area is part of the Waverly Woods Community. The redistricting plan only calls for 6169 to move when no other part of the Waverly Woods Community has been asked to move. Furthermore, other areas which are not part of the Waverly Woods Community but feed into Waverly Elementary are left untouched. For example Taylor's Farm and the Woodstock Road areas. Accordingly, this proposed action is not in line with the planning goal of keeping communities together.
- 4. One fact which may or may not be known by the planners is that the vast majority of the 20 -30 children in 6169 are Indian, Chinese and Korean. My child is one of the few Caucasian children. The Waverly Woods Community as a whole is predominantly white. While I'm not suggesting in any way that the proposed move of 6169 is racially based; an outside observer may see significance in the fact that the only section of the entire Waverly Woods Community moved was the only predominately non white section. Especially, given that there were other choices with regard to areas outside of the Waverly Woods Community that could have been moved. Furthermore, many of the children's parents are in varying stages of learning English and integrating into a new country. This proposed move could prove more difficult for those in this situation and could adversely impact the children.

In closing, I'm not experienced with planning and redistricting matters and I do not have all the details surrounding this issue nor do I have a full understanding of each proposed plan. So I apologize if I didn't use the correct terminology or if I have misconstrued something I heard at

the August 7, 2012 planning meeting. I greatly appreciate you taking the time to read and consider this letter and I hope that you can find an alternative to redistricting polygon 6169.

Dear ACC Members,

As a longtime resident of the Glenmont community, I was shocked to hear of a proposal to redistrict our neighborhood from Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS). This change would recreate an inappropriate feed, which was corrected, only after all four of my children had been subjected to it. What dire circumstances could justify isolating such a small group of children as they transition from middle school to high school?

I served on a HCPSS redistricting committee many years ago. The challenges associated with changing demographics, school locations and seat availability are enormous. The language of "polygons' is familiar to me. The task you face is formidable.

Have the underlying principles associated with decision making changed? There are set criteria for determining which students are "walkers" and which students are determined to be eligible for bus service. For example, all Glenmont students attend the same elementary school, yet our small neighborhood is divided by HCPSS into two groups. One group rides the bus; the other group is identified as "walkers." The division lines occur at what appear to be very random locations throughout the neighborhood. In actuality the division lines are based on the distance each house is located from a path which cuts through a wooded area to Thunder Hill Road. There are at least three locations in Glenmont where next door neighbors are either "walkers" or "bus riders" to elementary school. HCPSS must associate some value with **not** busing walkers, otherwise, why not bus all the children in a particular

fall of 2002 I attended Back to School Night at 3 different high schools. Why? My two oldest sons were in their junior & senior years at Howard High. My twins were in 9<sup>th</sup> grade, one at Long Reach High School in the tech magnet program and the other at Oakland Mills High School as an out of district student at our request. The ensuing four years cemented in my mind the incredible number of advantages associated with being within walking distance of high school!

What does this have to do with middle school feed? By HCPSS standards, our neighborhood is clearly tied to Howard High School. We are "walkers." Whatever middle school Glenmont children attend should have an established feed into Howard High School. Pulling a small # of students from a middle school, with a good feed, and transplanting them into a school with no feed, makes no sense. Middle school to high school is clearly an inappropriate time to ask children to make this kind of a change. Middle Schools merge students from various Elementary schools and *focus* on this process. High school is a whole different experience.

My point is about kids who live within walking distance of a high school, being given the opportunity to benefit from the advantages this allows. I realize the vast majority of Howard County students do not have this opportunity, but taking it away from those who do, does not give it to others. Creating a bad feed, with a huge break, at the transition from middle to high school actually hurts the students impacted.

Is it right for HCPSS to disregard its own redistricting criteria? Is it fair to place a small number of students in this situation? Are the handful of Glenmont students *really* the ones overcrowding EMMS? If so, shouldn't they be sent to a school that feeds into Howard High School? Is it possible that "Ellicott City" residents are being given preferential treatment over "Columbia" residents? (*Please note I do not ask this question in an inflammatory way, while I was on the redistricting committee it was pointed out to me that "Ellicott City residents deserved the seats in Ellicott City schools.*") These are the questions you must address.

The issue at hand is middle school, so I have not specifically addressed all the advantages associated with being able to walk to and from high school (I would be happy to share these with you. Please hit reply and we can set up a time to talk.)

My hope is that consideration of redistricting Glenmont to OMMS be totally dropped. It is actually quite *odd* that it was even proposed, given the Howard High "walker" status of our entire neighborhood. Thank you very much for giving consideration to the content of this email.

I am writing to express my concern and confusion over the more recently developed plans to move our community of Brampton Hills (polygons 1098 and 98) to Thunder Hill Elementary School for the 2013/2014 school year.

People in the community realize that the task of adjusting school districts in Howard County is an arduous process. It also sparks a great deal of emotion, because all parents are striving to do

what is best for their children. The plan, however, also needs to be based on logic, the overall health and safety of all children, and should not just be a numbers game where our children are continually moved around like pawns on a chess board.

When the original 2012 Feasibility Study was presented, our community was to move from Waterloo to Worthington. This is a logical choice. The geographical breakdown of Brampton Hills is as follows:

#### **Closest Schools (in order):**

- 1. Veterans
- 2. Worthington
- 3. Ilchester
- 4. Northfield
- 5. Rockburn
- Waterloo

For obvious reasons, this move made sense. It took us from the sixth closest school from our residence to the second closest. Based on the most recent plans, however, we are slated to move to Thunder Hill Elementary. This is the seventh closest school from our residence, even further than our current districted school of Waterloo. Although I applaud the efforts of residents and the AAC who have worked together this summer to put together alternate plans, when Plan J was initiated, the impact on the Brampton Hills Community (polygon 1098 and 98) was overlooked.

At this time I support the 2012 Feasibility Study which brought polygons 1098 and 98 to Worthington, or adjusting plan ACC-L6 to move polygons 1098 and 98 from Thunder Hill to Worthington.

At the beginning of this process the committee was asked to review several factors in assessing the reasonableness of moves within the County. The move of Brampton Hills to Thunder Hill contradicts the guiding principles of these factors, while the move to Worthington supports them.

#### • Educational Welfare of students in both the sending and receiving schools

Educational welfare of our children is predicated upon the social, physical, and emotional welfare of children. The current plan to move to Thunder Hill entails negative consequences such as longer bus rides each day for our children on major roads, which is a major safety concern. It also eliminates the opportunity for them to build a sense of community with neighboring children and residents.

The number one way that children thrive is by having parents involved in the school and building a strong community where both parent and child remain active. As we can all agree, this is crucial in the formative elementary years. Currently, parents in Brampton Hills already struggle with traveling a great distance to go to Waterloo. With these new alternatives, we are asked to start all over again at a neighborhood that is even farther from our homes.

A move to Worthington however, would: 1) help provide a sense of community by bringing our children closer to other area children attending that school, 2) promote a 'Healthy Howard'

community initiative through more play time in closer neighborhoods and, 3) allow more parents to get involved in their school community due to the proximity of the location. Worthington's educational scores would also align nicely with Brampton Hills' current school, Waterloo.

#### • Impact on the number of students bused and the distance bused students travel

Moving students from polygon 1098 and 98 to Thunder Hill will increase travel time for students, which is already needlessly lengthy due to the location of Waterloo and the roads needed to travel to get there from our community. Although on a polygon map it may appear that Thunder Hill is an option, our community does not have access to any other road other than route 103. Therefore, this map is a case of 'looks can be deceiving.' The move to Thunder Hill will create added congestion on routes 103 and routes 104, which is already extremely busy during school busing hours.

A move to Worthington, however, reduces bus time for students allowing them the opportunity for more productive activities than commuting. It also addresses safety issues related to travel. It cuts out needless traffic on route 104, and also creates less traffic and travel at the intersection of 103 and 104 which can be dangerous at all hours of the day.

#### Cost

Longer bus rides equal more mileage, more gas costs, more repair costs, needless congestion, etc, which a move to Thunder Hill would create. This type of daily travel also takes a toll on something more important than a checkbook; our children. As many parents can personally attest commuting is not fun. Children should not have to deal with the rigors of commuting at 5-11 years of age, especially when travel to Worthington could alleviate these costs, and even reduce these costs from the current travel to Waterloo.

#### Frequency with which students are redistricted

Every year, it appears that no one knows where to move Brampton Hills. Ten years ago we were at Ilchester and currently we are at Waterloo. The 2012 Feasibility Study yielded we should be at Worthington, Plan J moved us to Thunder Hill, while a plan entitled Ich2 which was worked on after Plan J suggested that we move back to Ilchester. Now with plan ACC-L6 we are back at Thunder Hill. This indecisiveness and movement causes a great deal of consternation to parents, students, and as I can imagine the Area Adjustment Board. It also does not instill a great deal of confidence to residents in this overall process. Since the move to Thunder Hill is without merit and there are no other apparent reasons to move us there, it sets us up for a possible future redistricting in less than 5 years.

By instituting a move to Worthington, as the 2012 Feasibility Plan suggested, long term projections would not change substantially for Worthington over time. Brampton (1098, 98), is a well-established neighborhood with no new spots for rebuilding, therefore, changes for long range planning are negligible.

As I have mentioned, we applaud the efforts of the committee. I do believe however, that the aforementioned reasons I have listed require consideration in Brampton Hills' (1098 and 98) move to Thunder Hill. Of course, Brampton Hills residents could start moving other polygon numbers around to suit our own purposes, and present that plan to you, however, we don't presume to

As a longtime resident of the Glenmont community, I was quite surprised to hear of a proposal to redistrict our neighborhood from Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) back to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS). This change would recreate an inappropriate middle school-to-high school feed that was resolved years ago. I understand the challenges associated with changing demographics, school locations and seat availability. I know that the task you face is formidable.

Until fairly recently, Glenmont students went to OMMS and then to Howard High. This very small group, only a few a year, were the *only* Howard High students to come from OMMS (once children from the Thunder Hill neighborhood were redistricted from Howard to Oakland Mills High). High school is a difficult transition in any event. It's a tough time to have no one to sit with at lunch? Or no familiar faces in any of your classes? While many children adapt and fit in even in those trying circumstances, some struggle. And in this case, for what purpose?

I can compare those experiences of a good and bad high school feed first hand. My two oldest sons went from OMMS to Howard High, but at the time students from Thunder Hill neighborhood still went to Howard, so there was a large group going there from OMMS. Since then, of course, Thunder Hill students were redistricted to Oakland Mills High, so only those few Glenmont residents would go from OMMS to Howard. When they were in 12th and 11th grade at Howard High, respectively, their twin brother and sister were entering 9th grade. My daughter chose to attend Oakland Mills high as an out-of-district student to avoid being separated from almost all of the friends with whom she had attended middle school. I suspect she would have struggled from the social isolation that a move to Howard High would have involved, though, of course, we'll never know. For her, attending OMHS was the right call. As a result of her decision, her transition to high school was fairly smooth. The point is that it seems so unnecessary to put this small group of kids in this position to be so isolated. There are so few of them, what problem would it be fixing? Why turn back the clock and recreate a problem that was resolved when the children were redistricted from OMMS to Ellicott Mills Middle?

My request is that consideration of redistricting Glenmont to OMMS be dropped. It is actually quite *odd* that it was even proposed, since it creates a problem that you have already fixed. Thank you very much for

Longer bus rides equal more mileage, more gas costs, more repair costs, needless congestion, etc, which a move to Thunder Hill would create. This type of daily travel also takes a toll on something more important than a checkbook; our children. As many parents can personally attest commuting is not fun. Children should not have to deal with the rigors of commuting at 5-11 years of age, especially when travel to Worthington could alleviate these costs, and even reduce these costs from the current travel to Waterloo.

#### Frequency with which students are redistricted

Every year, it appears that no one knows where to move Brampton Hills. Ten years ago we were at Ilchester and currently we are at Waterloo. The 2012 Feasibility Study yielded we should be at Worthington, Plan J moved us to Thunder Hill, while a plan entitled Ich2 which was worked on after Plan J suggested that we move back to Ilchester. Now with plan ACC-L6 we are back at Thunder Hill. This indecisiveness and movement causes a great deal of consternation to parents, students, and as I can imagine the Area Adjustment Board. It also does not instill a great deal of confidence to residents in this overall process. Since the move to Thunder Hill is without merit and there are no other apparent reasons to move us there, it sets us up for a possible future redistricting in less than 5 years.

By instituting a move to Worthington, as the 2012 Feasibility Plan suggested, long term projections would not change substantially for Worthington over time. Brampton (1098, 98), is a well-established neighborhood with no new spots for rebuilding, therefore, changes for long range planning are negligible.

As I have mentioned, we applaud the efforts of the committee. I do believe however, that the aforementioned reasons I have listed require consideration in Brampton Hills' (1098 and 98) move to Thunder Hill. Of course, Brampton Hills residents could start moving other polygon numbers

around to suit our own purposes, and present that plan to you, however, we don't presume to know the makeup of another neighborhood, just our own.

The last plan presented moved almost as many students as the original 2012 Feasibility plan. As everyone will agree if we are moving this many students in any plan, it should be the right move and not just a shift in an excel spreadsheet.

Dear AAC members,

I am writing to express my concern regarding the current proposal for redistricting the Glenmont neighborhood from Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) to Oakland Mils Middle School (OMMS).

While I understand that the AAC has a difficult task in finding a solution to current issues of overcrowding, the Glenmont community is small enough that it wouldn't have a noticeable impact on the overcrowding at EMMS. Additionally the redistricting the Glenmont students to OMMS creates a larger problem when the students transition to High School. Glenmont students are within walking distance to Howard High School. If the students were redistricted to OMMS, they would be the only students in the middle school to be fed into Howard High School. This is a feed of only1.8 percent, which would contradict HCPSS' Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15%. While one possible solution would be to redistrict to another high school, this would be counter to the benefits provided by our close proximity to Howard High School. In addition to the economic cost (of the bus and transportation costs) there is a community aspect that would be affected. Even though my son is only seven, we have already developed a relationship with Howard High School and its community. My son has developed a love of baseball and football and loves attending and rooting for his 'future team'. Since we can walk to the game, as a family we view this as a positive and healthy outing. No other high school is in walking distance and we feel it would be much more difficult to maintain that sense of community if he was fed into another.

Again, while I understand that there are real issues that the AAC needs to confront, I feel that the proposed solution of redistricting of Glenmont students to OMMS would create more problems in the long term. We feel that the value of maintaining our status as walkers to Howard High School outweighs the small benefit that redistricting Glenmont students to OMMS would provide to the overall plan. Therefore, I urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS or at any middle school that feeds to Howard HS.

We are a Worthington Family that is opposed to chipping off portion of the Worthington community.

We ask instead that you consider the following plan suggested by a Worthington community member a while ago. In his plan, polygons 1094, 2093, 3093, and 4093 would stay at Worthington, keeping Worthington intact. Ilchester would receive Polygons 74 and 2074, which is already in the feasibility study. Additionally, Ilchester would receive Polygons 98 and 1098, currently in the Feasibility Study as attending WoES. These four polygons all include neighborhoods that border one another. This would have the effect of keeping several bordering neighborhoods west of Route 103 attending the same school, Ilchester. Both districts would remain contiguous with no islands. Based on current numbers, it would result in 9 more students remaining at Worthington than in the current plans. This means WoES would be at 101.2 percent capacity and Ilchester at 103.0 percent, actually balancing it better than the Feasibility Study which would place WoES at 99.6 and Ilchester at 104.2.

Thank you for the numerous hours that you have committed to the AAC this summer. I know that the primary focus of the 2012 AAC is on elementary school redistricting, but I am contacting you because of indications that the AAC intends to discuss middle school redistricting at your final meetings.

I live in Glenmont (polygons 65, 1065, and 2065) and am writing to express my concern about the proposed redistricting of my neighborhood. The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) in 2014. This proposal would create a feeder problem because Glenmont students would be the only OMMS students to feed to Howard HS. To resolve this feeder problem, I fear that Glenmont students might be redistricted out of Howard HS.

Glenmont students currently <u>walk</u> to Howard HS. There are many reasons to keep walkers walkers—primarily financial and environmental reasons. In addition, sending high school students to a school that is not within walking distance puts more teenage drivers on the road ... and causes more teens to catch rides with their teenage friends, particularly after extracurricular activities. Here are some frightening statistics on teen drivers:

- Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for U.S. teens.
- The crash risk is particularly high during the first year that teenagers are eligible to drive.
- An AAA study shows that after-school hours can be as deadly for teenage drivers as weekend nights.
- The presence of teenage passengers increases the crash risk of teen drivers.

Having the option to walk to and from school reduces the number of teenage drivers on the road and the number of teens needing to catch rides with friends.

My name is Daniel Wilt, and I am a resident of the Brampton Hills Community, polygons 1098 and 98 (address: 4798 Ilkley Moor Lane, Ellicott City). I would like to thank the HCPSS Attendance Area Committee for bringing our polygons back to Worthington Elementary as originally specified in the 2012 Feasibility Study and I support the current Elementary School Plan AAC L7.

Over the years polygons 1098 and 98 have been moved from Worthington to Ilchester to Waterloo. It is time to return our students back to our community elementary school, Wortington, where we started so many years ago. There is the concern that the current plan will increase the projected utilization higher in the short term but it reduces over the longer term. I ask the Board of Education to consider addressing the projected utilization concerns for Worthington by increasing the school capacity to address the longer term utilization projections.

am writing this email to let you know that I do not approve of the BOE chipping off a portion of the Worthington Community. Here are the reasons why:

- We are a unique community with contiguous small roads where the elementary school is located in the middle of our neighborhood.
- While other schools in our area are positioned on more travelled roads and draw their attendance from many communities, ours is different.
- We are not looking for special treatment, just the same treatment that has been afforded to other contiguous communities such as Hollifield, Montgomery Meadows, Brampton Hills, Stonecrest, Wheatfield and many others in the county.
- The plans that chip portions of the Worthington Community off and send them to different schools use unnatural boundaries and send neighbors to different schools.
- Have you considered the following plan suggested by a Worthington community member a while ago? It seems quite feasible. In his plan, polygons 1094, 2093, 3093, and 4093 would stay at Worthington, keeping Worthington intact. Ilchester would receive Polygons 74 and 2074, which is already in the feasibility study. Additionally, Ilchester would receive Polygons 98 and 1098, currently in the Feasibility Study as attending WoES. These four polygons all include neighborhoods that border one another. Travel time for students to either school would be minimally effected. Obviously, the goal on our part is to keep Worthington intact, but this would also have the effect of keeping several bordering neighborhoods west of Route 103 attending the same school, Ilchester. Both districts would remain contiguous with no islands. Based on current numbers, it would result in 9 more students remaining at Worthington than in the current plans. This means WoES would be at 101.2 percent capacity and Ilchester at 103.0 percent, actually balancing it better than the Feasibility Study which would place WoES at 99.6 and Ilchester at 104.2. We didn't look at FARMS numbers and test scores, but knowing the neighborhoods, it should be negligible; they are all of similar socioeconomic status.
- I realize that many students and families need to be impacted by this redistricting but it doesn't make sense to move students unnecessarily.

Thank you for your consideration to keep the Worthington Community intact.

People in the community realize that the task of adjusting school districts in Howard County is an arduous process. It also sparks a great deal of emotion, because all parents are striving to do what is best for their children. The plan, however, also needs to be based on logic, the overall health and safety of all children, and should not just be a numbers game where our children are continually moved around like pawns on a chess board.

When the original 2012 Feasibility Study was presented, our community was to move from Waterloo to Worthington. This is a logical choice. The geographical breakdown of Brampton Hills is as follows:

# Closest Schools (in order):

- 1. Veterans
- 2. Worthington
- 3. Ilchester
- 4. Northfield
- 5. Rockburn
- 6. Waterloo

For obvious reasons, this move made sense. It took us from the sixth closest school from our residence to the second closest. Based on the most recent plans, however, we are slated to move to Thunder Hill Elementary. This is the seventh closest school from our residence even further than our current districted school of Waterloo. Although I applaud the efforts of residents and the AAC who have worked together this summer to put together alternate plans, when Plan J was initiated, the impact on the Brampton Hills' Community (polygon 1098 and 98) was overlooked.

At this time I support the 2012 Feasibility Study which brought polygons 1098 ad 98 to Worthington, or adjusting plan ACC-L6 to move polygons 1098 and 98 from Thunder Hill to Worthington.

At the beginning of this process the committee was asked to review several factors in assessing the reasonableness of moves within the county. The move of Brampton Hills to Thunder Hill contradicts the guiding principles of these factors, while the move to Worthington supports them.

Educational Welfare of students in both the sending and receiving schools

Educational welfare of our children is predicated upon the social, physical, and emotional welfare of children. The current plan to move to Thunder Hill entails negative consequences such as longer bus rides each day for our children on major roads, which is a major safety concern. It also eliminates the opportunity for them to build a sense of community with neighboring children and residents.

The number one way that children thrive is by having parents involved in the school and building a strong community where both parent and child remain active. As we can all agree, this is crucial in the formative elementary years. Currently, parents in Brampton Hills already struggle with traveling a great distance to go to Waterloo. With these new alternatives, we are asked to start all over again at a neighborhood that is even farther from our homes.

A move to Worthington however, would: 1) help provide a sense of community by bringing our children closer to other area children attending that school, 2) promote a 'Healthy Howard' community initiative through more play time in closer neighborhoods and, 3) allow more parents to get involved in their school community due to the proximity of the location. Worthington's educational scores would also align nicely with Brampton Hills' current school, Waterloo.

# Impact on the number of students bused and the distance bused students travel

Moving students from polygon 1098 and 98 to Thunder Hill will increase travel time for students, which isalready needlessly lengthy due to the location of Waterloo and the roads needed to travel to get there from our community. Although on a polygon map it may appear that Thunder Hill is an option, our community does not have access to any other road other than route 103. Therefore, this map is a case of 'looks can be deceiving. The move to Thunder Hill will create added congestion on routes 103 and routes 104, which is already extremely busy during school busing hours.

A move to Worthington, however, reduces bus time for students allowing them the opportunity for moreproductive activities than commuting. It also addresses safety issues related to travel. It cuts out needless traffic on route 104, and also creates less traffic and travel at the intersection of 103 and 104 which can be dangerous at all hours of the day.

# Cost

Longer bus rides equal more mileage, more gas costs, more repair costs, needless congestion, etc, which a move to Thunder Hill would create. This type of daily travel also takes a toll on something more important than a checkbook;

our children. As many parents can personally attest commuting is not fun. Children should not have to deal with the rigors of commuting at 5-11 years of age, especially when travel to Worthington could alleviate these costs, and evereduce these costs from the current travel to Waterloo.

## Frequency with which students are redistricted

Every year, it appears that no oneknows where to move Brampton Hills. Ten years ago we were at Ilchester and currently we are at Waterloo. The 2012 Feasibility Study yielded we should be at Worthington, Plan J moved us to Thunder Hill, while a plan entitled Ich2 which was worked on after Plan J suggested that we move back to Ilchester. Now with plan ACC-L6 we are back at Thunder Hill. This indecisiveness and movement causes a great deal of consternation to parents, students, and as I can imagine the Area Adjustment Board. It also does not instill a great deal of confidence to residents in this overall process. Since the move to Thunder Hill is without merit and there are no other apparent reasons to move us there, it sets us up for a possible future redistricting in less than 5 years.

By instituting a move to Worthington, as the 2012 Feasibility Plan suggested, long term projections would not change substantially for Worthington over time. Brampton (1098, 98), is a well-established neighborhood with no new spots for rebuilding, therefore, changes for long range planning are negligible.

As I havementioned, I applaud the efforts of the committee. I do believe however, that the aforementioned reasons I have listed require consideration in Brampton Hills' (1098 and 98) move to Thunder Hill. Of course Brampton Hills residents could start moving other polygon numbers around to suit our own purposes, and present that plan to you, however, we don't presume to know the makeup of another neighborhood, just our own.

The last plan presented moved almost as many students as the original 2012 Feasibility plan. As everyone will agree if we are moving this many students in anyplan, it should be the right move and not just a shift in an excel spreadsheet

Thank you for your consideration of this matter. At all future AAC meetings, Brampton Hills residents will have a significant presence. Please look for our blue shirts.

Dear AAC members,

As a resident in the Glenmont neighborhood in Columbia, I am concerned about the proposed redistricting of my neighborhood.

Our current districting includes Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and Howard HS (to which we are walkers). The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) in 2014. This proposal would, however, create a feeder problem because Glenmont students would be the only OMMS students to feed to Howard HS—*a feed of only 1.8 percent*. That would be an incredibly small feed at an incredibly important developmental stage in our children's lives. Plus, it would contradict HCPSS's Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15 percent.

I am also concerned that if Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they might then be redistricted out of Howard HS to resolve the feeder problem. AAC members clearly appreciate the value—both the financial and environmental value—of maintaining walkers as walkers, and it is critically important to me that my neighborhood remains one that *walks* to Howard HS.

As current walkers to Thunder Hill we have come to really appreciate the benefits of a sense of community. We have developed solid relationships with other parents and students as a result of being walkers and have been able to play an active role in volunteering and extracurricular activities. I would like my children to continue their education through the system and have a consistent base of friends continue with them. By redistricting us to a school further away and potentially out of Howard High due to Policy 6010, I would see that as a loss of community for my children. Therefore, I urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS so that we can continue to feed to Howard HS with a unified group of students.

Although I recognize that the primary focus of the 2012 AAC is on elementary school redistricting, I am contacting you because of indications that the AAC intends to discuss middle school redistricting at your final meetings. Thus, this seems like an appropriate time to share my concerns about the proposed redistricting of Glenmont.

We are in favor of Polygon 7169, the Taylor Farm neighborhood, staying at Waverly Woods Elementary and NOT being redistricted to West Friendship Elementary as in the proposed plan. My family has lived in the Waverly Woods community for over ten years. Our son will begin fourth grade at Waverly Elementary this fall, and our daughter will be entering kindergarten in 2013. We recently purchased a new construction on Taylor Farm Road (Polygon 7169) specifically because that area was districted for Waverly Woods Elementary.

We agree with Ms. Cristen Boarman's email dated August 8, 2012, in which she states that, "Waverly is a newer school with county sewer/water service with a proposed addition that can handle more students than West Friendship". In the Feasibility Study, it states that there is also the possibility of closing West Friendship due to its age. If that happens, it would require redistricting students again. There is a planned Waverly addition included in the capital plan and the possibility of a new elementary school in Turf Valley in the future. For these reasons, Plan L10, which leaves Pologons 6169, 7169 and 166 at Waverly Elementary School, make the most sense. If there is to be more redistricting in Howard County in the next few years, I think it is more prudent to be conservative and redistrict fewer children in the west.

On a personal level, we are in favor of staying at Waverly because West Friendship is five and half miles from our home, while Waverly is a little over a mile and a half away. My husband and I both work and use the Before and After Care program provided at Waverly. West Friendship is further from our work offices and will increase our commuting time and distance travelled, since we provide transportation to and from Before and After Care. Even though we are no longer part of Waverly Woods Owners Association, our community backs to the Waverly Woods neighborhood, and we are within walking distance of Waverly community pool and shopping. The boundary of Marriottsville Road on the west is now the cutoff for Waverly Elementary, and it makes sense as a natural boundary for the



Dear Attendance Area Committee members.

I have three children, one of whom was redistricted into Veterans in 2007, and two who currently attend. I served as PTA president for two years and became very familiar with the challenges of such a large and overcrowded school.

I am aware that several plans are being discussed by the attendance area committee, including L10, which would move students IN to Veterans from surrounding neighborhoods. I have some serious concerns with Plan L10 that I hope the AAC and the Board will consider:

Plan L10 calls for removing 474 students from VES. That is a very large number of students to whom the remaining students will have to say goodbye, and is significantly more than the removal of 340 students, as recommended in the June 2012 Feasibility Study. Although I am well aware that a large number of students must removed, the idea of losing 474 children who are part of the VES community is heartbreaking. Losing almost half of our current student population will make the student body nearly unrecognizable.

Despite removing 474 students, Plan L10 then moves IN a large number of students, so that the net decrease in enrollment is only 261 students. A net removal of 261 students brings VES right to capacity. We have five years of history now showing that VES consistently and rapidly grows beyond any estimates. Removing 261 students is not enough to relieve VES of its overcrowding for any meaningful period of time. Removing less than 300 students almost guarantees that VES will be overcrowded again in the near future.

The VES community has waited patiently for this redistricting. We have been told for the past couple years that we had to wait for the widepread redistricting with the opening of the new elementary school, even though relief at VES was needed much sooner. As PTA president I heard from parents and staff members who found the size of the school difficult to manage. Our students deserve to have the redistricting done right: Pull enough students out to bring us down to capacity, and maybe even a little bit below capacity, given our proven track record of quickly and steadily increasing in enrollment.

I don't feel comfortable suggesting which polygons should move and which polygons should stay. We are a big school community, but we are a close community, and it will be very difficult to see anyone go. So I am writing in hope of persuading you of the importance of removing enough students--at least 300--to make a real difference for a decent amount of time.

Dear Attendance Area Committee members,

I am the President of the Woods of Tiber Branch Homeowners Association, a community that currently is served by Veterans Elementary and Ellicott Mills Middle. I also have two children who have both attended Veterans Elementary and my eldest child is about to embark on her student career at Ellicott Mills Middle. An active member of the Veterans Elementary PTA, I have chaired several committees over my five years at VES and act as volunteer in the classroom.

Our homeowners have recently become aware that a new redistricting proposal (Plan L10) has been discussed which will move our community (polygon 1102) from Veterans Elementary to Northfield Elementary. While we understand that in order to balance the enrollment needs of the entire county redistricting is necessary, we respectfully request that our community continue to be served by Veterans Elementary and Ellicott Mills Middle. Our community was a part of the previous redistricting which moved our children from Worthington Elementary to Veterans so we have first-hand experienced how this impacts a community. Despite this our children adopted and have made Veterans Elementary their home. Furthermore, many of our families have developed relationships with families in the Stonecrest, Ellicott Station and Brittany Drive neighborhoods (polygons 3101 and 1101) and we feel strongly that these bonds should not be broken by moving our neighborhood to Northfield Elementary.

While we are pleased that the current plans leave our community in Ellicott Mills Middle, we believe this new elementary redistricting plan creates unreasonable disruption to our families as the majority of the children attending Northfield Elementary will attend Dunloggin Middle School while our children will move on to Ellicott Mills. While making new friends is a part of life, the current proposal seems rather harsh given that this redistricting plan will remove them from the friendships they have developed at Veterans forcing them to make new ones at Northfield only to have these once again broken as they move into middle school. We believe that it is important to maintain the existing feeder pattern that already exists – Veterans to Ellicott Mills to Centennial High. Keeping students together through elementary, middle and high school helps students feel socially established and confident as they approach their important high school years.

In reviewing Plan L10 it appears that this same issue will be experienced by polygon 102 as they are currently assigned to Veterans Elementary only to be sent to Dunloggin Middle while the majority of Veterans moves on to Ellicott Mills. Perhaps one solution to this problem is to move polygon 102 to Northfield Elementary and leave polygon 1102 at Veterans Elementary. This shift would not have an impact on the capacity of either school as the current enrollment of polygon 102 is approximately 33 students compared to our polygon of 35 students.

After talking to others in my community and reviewing the detailed data, we thought it might help the plan if you moved our polygon (2074) and polygon 74 (our neighbors) to Veterans Elementary instead of Ilchester as this would allow our neighborhood to stay at Ellicott Mills MS. Our neighborhoods would also be in favor of this move. I believe this would do the following for your plan:

- A lower utilization rate would be created at Bonnie Branch MS (when I calculated the rate without our group, it came down to 109%, while Ellicott Mills came up to 105%) as this would eliminate our "low feed" status and allow us to stay at our current Middle School, which is Ellicott Mills.
- Ilchester's utilization rate should come down to 100%, while Veterans would only go up to 107%.

I think this would also create an easier transition for the elementary school students in our area as they would move to their new school with several other friends from the Brampton and Wheatfield communities who currently attend elementary school with us. I know this is a difficult process, but thought this might help your current plan as I believe this would eliminate the weakness at Bonnie Branch MS. We appreciate your efforts to keep our polygon with other neighborhoods in our community.

As a parent I feel that one of the most important issues with raising children is to have consistency. The Feasibility Study's major weakness is that is appears to shuffel students cyclically between Rockburn and Ilchester. Plan L10 addresses this issue and also moves fewer students on a whole while at the same time addresses issues in the western part of the county (Swansfield and Turf valley) that won't have to be addressed in later redistricting.

I live in the Glenmont neighborhood in Columbia for nine years and am raising a family in a great community. I am writing to express my concern about the proposed redistricting of my neighborhood.

Glenmont students currently attend Ellicott Mills Middle School (EMMS) and walk to Howard HS. The 2012 Feasibility Study proposes sending Glenmont students to Oakland Mills Middle School (OMMS) in 2014. This proposal would, however, create a feeder problem because Glenmont students would be the only OMMS students to feed to Howard HS—a feed of only 1.8 percent. That would be an incredibly small feed at an incredibly important developmental stage in our childrens' lives. Plus, it would contradict HCPSS's Policy 6010, which recommends avoiding feeds of less than 15 percent.

I am also concerned that if Glenmont students are redistricted to OMMS, they might then be redistricted out of Howard HS to resolve the feeder problem. AAC members clearly appreciate the value—both the financial and environmental value—of maintaining walkers as walkers, and it is critically important to me that my neighborhood remains one that walks to Howard HS. Therefore, I urge you to keep Glenmont at EMMS or at any middle school that feeds to Howard HS.

For one, it overall moves less students around (approximately 200) while at the same time addresses the capacity issues in some western Howard County schools. Also, schools such as Clarksville Elementary, Tridelphia Ridge Elementary and West Friendship Elementary are better utilized.

Second, the back and forth of students from IES to/from Rockburn is eliminated.

Another advantage that comes to mind is that it keeps students from close by neighborhoods along I 95 and routes 29 and 100 closer together in schools near their neighborhoods which is ideal.

As a family, we feel L10 is in our best interest and would like to see the AAC present this plan to the BOE. Thank you for your time!

Dear Attendance Area Committee and Office of School Planning,

We would like to thank the Attendance Area Committee and the Office of School Planning for your hard work and dedication over the past several weeks. We feel that your efforts have produced a comprehensive plan that is better than the original feasibility study. The AAC took many considerations into account such as listening to community feedback, working hard to keep neighborhoods together, reducing the amount of time kids spend on the bus each day, minimizing the number of children moved, minimizing the number of

schools impacted, taking advantage of extra capacity in Western Howard County, and incorporating some of the 2016 redistricting in 2013.

Specifically, we fully support plan L10. We hope that on Tuesday, August 28th, the AAC will reach consensus on plan L10, and that the Office of School Planning will recommend plan L10 to the Board of Education this fall.

Plan L10 moves approximately 200 fewer students than the original feasibility study. Even with 200 less students moved, plan L10 addresses issues in western Howard County (Swansfield and Turf Valley area) that the feasibility study did not plan until the 2016 redistricting. L10 is a stronger plan, because it fixes several capacity issues in the west that the feasibility study did not address in 2013, while moving fewer students overall.

Plan L10 impacts fewer schools in the Northeast than the original feasibility study. When compared to the feasibility study, plan L10 eliminates the eastward domino movement of students from Waterloo to Worthington, from Worthington to Ilchester, from Ilchester to Rockburn and from Rockburn to Elkridge. Plan L10 also eliminates the cyclical shuffling of students between Rockburn and Ilchester. Ilchester, Worthington and Thunder Hill are not impacted by plan L10. The feasibility study moved 430 students from these three schools, whereas L10 moves zero. Plan L10 also has less of an impact to Deep Run (52 less children moved), Elkridge (19 less children moved), and Rockburn (69 less children moved).

# Plan L10 appears better from a transportation

perspective. The new elementary school attending area in plan L10 takes better advantage of the neighborhoods near the school to potentially increase the number of students who could walk to the school. Overall, the boundary lines provide closer proximity to schools, particularly for the neighborhoods near Route 100, I-95 and Route 29. Plan L10 keeps polygons 1080 and 80 along Mayfield Avenue together going to the same school (Waterloo), making bus transportation easier along this route. Also, plan L10 moves less students to Elkridge (polygons 92 and 44 stay at Rockburn), establishing a smaller geographic attendance area for Elkridge.

# Plan L10 makes better use of existing capacity in the

**west.** Plan L10 helps solve overcrowding problems further east by utilizing extra capacity at Clarksville, West Friendship and Tridelphia Ridge.

These are a few reasons why we feel plan L10 is an improvement over the original feasibility study and we hope that the AAC reaches consensus on this plan next week.

As parents of three children that may be impacted by this redistricting effort, we are writing you to encourage your support of the L10 plan over the Feasibility Study. We know that you have worked hard to take into account many different communities' concerns about both the feasibility study and other intermediate plans but it seems that the L10 plan is the most comprehensive and addresses more of those concerns, like keeping neighborhoods together and reducing the amount of time that kids spend on the bus each day. The east is overcrowded while there are elementary schools in the west like Clarksville, West Friendship and Tridelphia Ridge, that are underutilized (there was an article several months ago in the Howard County Times about the empty classrooms at Tridelphia Ridge). In our opinion, we should be trying to better utilize existing space while at the same time minimizing the number of students that need to move to new schools, especially to schools that are already over capacity. We would like to respectfully submit to the committee our support for Plan L10 as we feel that this is probably the best plan with least impact to students and schools. It appears that Plan L10 moves approximately 200 fewer students than the Feasibility Study (2657 versus 2866) while addressing issues in western Howard County (Swansfield and Turf Valley) area and fixes several capacity issues in the west. L10 also appears to eliminate the eastward domino movement of students from Waterloo to Ilchester to Rockburn to Elkridge while impacting fewer schools in the North East Region (no impact to Ilchester, Worthington and Thunder Hill). Dear Attendance Area Committee members,

I am the resident of the Woods of Tiber Branch and have recently become aware that a new redistricting proposal (Plan L10) has been discussed which will move our community (polygon 1102) from Veterans Elementary to Northfield Elementary. While we understand that in order to balance the enrollment needs of the entire county redistricting is necessary, we respectfully request that our community continue to be served by Veterans Elementary and Ellicott Mills Middle. Our community was a part of the previous redistricting which moved our children from Worthington Elementary to Veterans so we have first-hand experienced how this impacts a community. Despite this our children adopted and have made Veterans Elementary their home. Furthermore, many of our families have developed relationships with families in the Stonecrest, Ellicott Station and Brittany Drive neighborhoods (polygons 3101 and 1101) and we feel strongly that these bonds should not be broken by moving our neighborhood to Northfield Elementary.

While we are pleased that the current plans leave our community in Ellicott Mills Middle, we believe this new elementary redistricting plan creates unreasonable disruption to our families as the majority of the children attending Northfield Elementary will attend Dunloggin Middle School while our children will move on to Ellicott Mills. While making new friends is a part of life, the current proposal seems rather harsh given that this redistricting plan will remove them from the friendships they have developed at Veterans forcing them to make new ones at Northfield only to have these once again broken as they move into middle school. We believe that it is important to maintain the existing feeder pattern that already exists – Veterans to Ellicott Mills to Centennial High. Keeping students together through elementary, middle and high school helps students feel socially established and confident as they approach their important high school years.

In reviewing Plan L10 it appears that this same issue will be experienced by polygon 102 as they are currently assigned to Veterans Elementary only to be sent to Dunloggin Middle while the majority of Veterans moves on to Ellicott Mills. Perhaps one solution to this problem is to move polygon 102 to Northfield Elementary and leave polygon 1102 at Veterans Elementary. This shift would not have an impact on the capacity of either school as the current enrollment of polygon 102 is approximately 33 students compared to our polygon of 35 students.

We understand the complexity of this project and appreciate the diligence that you have shown in this difficult process. We believe that maintaining the continuity of the Veterans Elementary to Ellicott Mills Middle feeder relationship is important to the development of our children and respectfully request that you develop a redistricting plan that maintains this relationship.

After talking to other neighbors we are in support of the current plan (L10). We also noticed that there was an issue with the utilization rate at Bonnie Branch MS that was created from plan (M9). An option to the plan could be to move our polygon (2074) and polygon 74 (our neighbors) to Veterans Elementary instead of Ilchester. I believe this would do the following for your plan:

- A lower utilization rate would be created at Bonnie Branch MS (when calculated the rate without our group came down to 109%, while Ellicott Mills came up to 105%) as this would eliminate our "low feed" status and allow us to stay at our current Middle School, which is Ellicott Mills., and current high school, Howard High.
- Ilchester's utilization rate should come down to 100%, while Veterans would only go up to 107%.

Also it may create an easier transition for the elementary school students in our area as they would move to their

new school with several other friends from the Brampton and Wheatfield communities who currently attend school with us AND keep us feeding to Ellicott Mills and Howard High School.

Hi,

Our family lives in Polygon #95 in the Montgomery Meadows area of Howard County. I have been following the redistricting plans and the discussions at the AAC meetings throughout the summer. I have been pleased with how the committee has addressed concerns raised by citizens across the county. They have addressed issues of keeping neighborhoods together, keeping down the time to bus elementary students to and from schools, and reducing the number of students affected by redistricting while trying to meet the goals set forth in the 2012 feasibility study. I believe that the latest plan developed by the AAC, known as L10, achieves these objectives and is an improvement over the plan presented in the feasibility study. L10 moves about 200 fewer students than the feasibility study and achieves not only the 2013 redistricting goals, but also addresses some of the concerns in the western portion of the county particularly in the Swansfield and Turf Valley areas. The L10 plan also does a better job of defining school attending areas in the northeast portion of the county. In particular, the L10 plan defines the attending area for the new elementary school in a way that takes better advantage of land closer to the school location so that there can be a larger area where students could walk to school. Also, the region between routes 29, Route 100, and I-95 allow for more natural boundaries. The L10 plan allows students who live in this area to go to schools closer to where they actually live and should reduce transportation costs and concerns for the school system.

While redistricting is a hard problem to solve when opening a new school, the AAC has come up with a reasonable plan in L10. Our family supports the L10 plan and feels it is a much better choice for the county than the original feasibility study plan.

I am writing to support the most recently revised plan and map, L10. This ensures that our close knit community stays together at Waverly Elementary. Even more importantly, our young children do not have an overly long bus ride to school, and do not get home too late in the afternoon to get to their after school activities on time. We live just over a mile from Waverly, on Woodstock Road, and my kids are on the bus for a minimum of 10 minutes just to make the run down the road and return to where they started. So, it takes approximately 15 minutes to get to the school after the kids get on the bus. How long will they be on the bus to go the approximately 6 miles to get to West Friendship? And, at what expense?

The numbers of students projected in the polygons along Woodstock Road is inflated. After this school year many of the kids in this community move onto middle school, and due to the nature of our rural neighborhood where families stay long after their kids have graduated from high school, they will not be replaced by a large group of younger children. I noticed that the map indicates a non-existent road and neighborhood (Davis Branch), and quite amusingly so does the newly published bus schedule! This neighborhood has not appeared on the developer's website with a date any more specific than "Coming Soon" for several years. The land was purchased for immediate development about eight (8) years ago.

I hope these comments are useful to support this plan (L10). I appreciate the great amount of time the committee has spent working on this project. It is a thankless job.

Dear Members of the Attendance Area Committee,

I am writing to voice my concerns over the proposed redistricting of Swansfield Elementary, the school where two of my children currently attend. I was happy to read the recommendation in the Feasibility Study to not redistrict our school at this time because I do not feel that our school is overcrowded. However, most of the plans that the committee have tested do not follow this recommendation and do redistrict Swansfield. As you are probably aware, Swansfield is a school with a high percentage of FARM students, and the suggestion to move polygons 53 and 2053 to Clemens Crossing increases this percentage. These polygons are primarily composed of single family homes with some townhouses and condos.

I would like to suggest another possible scenario which could ease the overcrowding at Swansfield, while creating more of a balance of FARM students between schools. The Clary's Forest community is located in and around the loop at the end of Little Patuxent Parkway. The outer loop is comprised of primarily single family homes and townhouses, while the inner loop is comprised of apartments and townhouses. I suggest moving polygon 2135 or 2174 to Clemens Crossing instead.

I realize that this would create an island, but I believe that it would be an appropriate alternative to continuing the wave of economic segregation occurring in our Columbia schools. Since there are apartments and low income housing in the neighborhoods close to most Columbia schools, these neighborhoods are walk zones and are not considering for redistricting when the school becomes overcrowded. This is the case for Swansfield. Unfortunately this leaves the outer boundaries where single family home neighborhoods are usually situated, and these neighborhoods are the first to be moved to other schools with virtually no FARM students. This is a serious problem and is having real effects on Columbia neighborhoods and property values. However, polygons 2135 and 2174 have a mix of apartments and townhouses and these students are already bus riders, so there would not be a significant increase in transportation costs. I also believe that these polygons have a good balance of FARM and non-FARM students.

Balancing the FARM ratios between Swansfield and Clemens Crossing could be beneficial to both schools. Swansfield would be able to serve all remaining students more effectively and Clemens Crossing would be able to provide a more diverse environment for their students. Please help our school by not taking our single family home neighborhoods! I don't believe that Clemens Crossing has any apartments within their boundaries currently. Swansfield serves at least 9 apartment complexes, with 4 of those complexes being bused from Polygons 2135 and 2174. We need to make an effort to provide a fair and equitable learning

#### Dear Board Members,

I wanted to take this opportunity to express my view about the redistricting effort. I am sure everyone has a story or a compelling need, but our voices need to be heard. I also understand this is not an easy process and in the end, you will not please everyone. You have been assigned a difficult task, and I trust in your abilities to do the right thing. As a citizen of Howard County, time and time again I observe children residing in areas and attend schools where they are not zoned. How does this happen? We recently had a family residing in our neighborhood and the family was using another address so their daughter could attend River Hill. More recently, another family moved into the neighborhood behind our house, and their son is attending Worthington this year. While I inquired about changing schools several years ago as VES was so overcrowded; I was denied that opportunity. I was honest about where I lived, and even stated I would provide my own transportation, but my request was denied. For a family that pays a lot of money in taxes, this just does not go over well. So here we are again..... As the school year begins tomorrow, my children (both boys, one entering 5th grade at VES and the other 7th grade at EMMS) are extremely excited to start another school year, and most importantly to them-see all their friends. We have been attending VES since it opened. While VES is a nice school, it has been in great need of a reduction in attendance since the school opened. No doubt, Principal Bruce is doing a good job at handling the unique challenges facing such a culturally diverse elementary school population; however, he needs assistance from the county. VES has been so overcrowded since it's doors opened, and because of that I feel my children have more than paid the price. When my youngest son was in third grade, he ate lunch at 1:40 pm and now for the second year in a row, he is forced to be educated in a portable, which seems to be the case in most Howard County schools these days. The result of such overcrowding has directly impacted the learning environment and not to mention the daily life threatening situation which occurs during pick up and drop off. I understand and encourage you to redistrict to make our schools a better place for education; however, I feel that once again, my children are paying the price according to your draft. According to your latest proposal, polygon 1102 is scheduled to be redistricted to Dunloggin Middle School in 2014. Based on my research, I am not receptive to that proposal. I am slated to be removed from EMMS-a Blue Ribbon school to one that is not, and has lower test scores. Would anyone be happy about that? My oldest son was a middle of the road performer while at VES, partly due to the large class sizes. Since he began middle school at EMMS, he has taken off. He is finally in a school where teachers want to teach, and enjoy what they do. He has performed well and really made us proud of his performance in sixth grade. In fact, during a parent/teacher conference, I was advised by a teacher at EMMS, there was definitely a difference in terms of intelligence/knowledge learned during the elementary school years. The teacher went on to say there is a noticeable difference between the children who attended VES as they are behind the curve. That too was evident by my son who came home and advised us classmates from other schools knew a lot more than him. As a parent, this is troubling, but we are getting him back on track and he is thriving. As I mentioned, EMMS is a blue ribbon school and the learning there is second to none. Not only from the teachers, but the principal, assistant principal, guidance counselors and reading specialists. We are truly happy at this school and really looking forward to having our youngest child join such a great learning environment. By redistricting us to a school of lesser quality is heartbreaking. In the 1102 polygon there are only 25 students and would greatly appreciate staying put. After attending the ever exploding VES, I feel we have more than paid the price and deserve a top notch school-EMMS. When considering the redistricting plan, please keep in mind those who suffered through VES and are now flying high at EMMS. I beg you, please give us a break-we deserve it.

I appreciate the plans are fluid and may change. I am also thankful for the hard (and probably thankless) work by the Office of School Planning and the Committee.

I urge them to continue to support Plans AAC\_L10 and AAC\_M9. These Plans appear to satisfy a vast majority of the criteria upon which redistricting is (or should be) based, including moving students from an elementary school with a 100% capacity/utilization to one with 72%, and a middle school with a 114% to one with a 77%, as it relates to my community.

More importantly, taking the County as a whole, it appears these Plans have negligible effect on FARMS ratios, but great impact on balancing utilizations percentages across the schools. I would imagine these are two very important criteria because smaller but equally diverse classrooms equal more opportunity for success for the students.

We propose the following remedy for the current redistricting of neighborhoods adjacent and part of Hobbit's Glen: go forth with the FARM rate as planned, but also include the entire neighborhood of Hobbit's Glen in the redistricting plans. Our proposal is based as follows:

My family and I reside at 5108 Watchwood Path, in the Hobbit's Glen neighborhood of Howard County's school district. One of the incentives for selecting this community was largely due to the Howard County Schools. We studied the districting and have watched carefully all redistricting plans. However, we are very disturbed with the current proposal that will result in a split redistricting of our neighborhood. Specifically, we understand that discussions are underway to include Polygons 141 and 1141 with the redistricting of Polygons 175, 177, 1175, 1177, 2175 in redistricting proposal L10 for elementary school and M9 for middle school.

With respect to using MSA results as a valuation measure although Longfellow enjoys MSAs that meet Howard county's standards in reading and math, Triadelphia Ridge (90.6 and 85.5, respectively) far exceeds these standards (98.2 and 98.2, respectively). With respect to using the FARM rate for establishing redistricting, this decision results in splitting Hobbits Glen with long term implications that potentially affect the complexity of our neighborhood. In this regard, homes on one side of Hobbit's Glen will be able to market their location as having access to Triadelphia Ridge or Clarksville schools, which clearly are known factors in home valuation that represent important considerations for neighborhood selection.

Hobbit's Glen is a diverse community that will add to the diversity of Triadelphia Ridge or Clarksville schools. Further, we believe the decision to split our neighborhood is fundamentally unfair. It is incomprehensible to understand why one side of Hobbit's Glen is selected over the other? It is not our desire to question the FARM calculations, but the basis for such allocation decision must result in equitable outcomes. To this point, an equitable decision should result in the inclusion of all or none of Hobbit's Glen.

An increase in the percentage of FARM students has not stopped the committee in the past and is not stopping the committee this year! Please look at the increases that are in the L7 plan (the last plan with an assessment). We are also concerned that the FARM percentages that are reported in the assessment don't match what is reported on the school's website. For instance on the PLES website indicates 40.6% FARMS and Longfellow ES indicates 33% FARM rate.

Other Schools with FARM increase

- -HCMS 31% to 33%
- -WLMS 36% to 38%
- -DRES 35% to 40%
- -PLES 46%-51% 76 students moved from Montjoy community to Thunder-hill School
- -Steven's Forest 50% 56%

We implore you to ensure that the redistricting decision be applied equally within the same neighborhood. Thus we propose the following alternative, which we believe is sensible and doable. That is, we recommend achieving the FARM rate as planned, but also to include the entire neighborhood of Hobbit's Glen in the redistricting plans. We believe this approach represents a realistic option for achieving an equitable and amenable solution for all parties.

The reason for not including these 20 students is because the FARM would increase from 36% - 41%. Without these 20 students the FARM rate would be 39%. What is so disruptive about moving 20 additional kids out? The school isn't changing, there should be no impact. It is more disruptive splitting these neighborhoods and tearing the kids apart from their friends and the kids with whom they currently ride the bus. Why would we separate neighborhoods and friends because the FARM rate increased from 39% to 40%. Also, what is so different about the 56 kids being moved out of Longfellow vs. the 60 being moved out of Swansfield. The only difference is that the school is larger and therefore the loss of students impacts their FARM rate less. If there is a major concern about the number of FARM students then please send some of the FARM students with us. We would welcome these kids with open arms and will be happy to ride the bus to school with them.

Longfellow is due to be renovated and it has been suggested that they use swing space to accommodate the kids while this renovation happens. I believe the suggested space is the old Faulkner Ridge School. Moving these students would help with fewer portables and less space at Faulkner Ridge would be needed. Also, transporting these kids from Hobbit's Glen to Triadelphia Ridge is not difficult since Harpers Farm turns into Homewood and Folly Quarter Road and then one turn will take you to the school. So, access to the school is as easy or easier than access from 108.

Hobbit's Glen is a diverse community that will add to the diversity of Triadelphia Ridge. Please keep these communities together. These are very diverse communities with more in common than they have different. These kids go to camp together, ride the bus together, compete on the same swim teams and attend the boys and girls scouts together. Please do not leave 20 students out of the redistricting effort so that the FARM rate will be 39% instead of 41%.

To include Polygons 141 and 1141 with the redistricting of Polygons 175, 177, 1175, 1177, 2175 in redistricting proposal L10 for elementary school and M9 for middle school.

The reason for not including these 20 students is because the FARM would increase from 36% - 41%. Without these 20 students the FARM rate would be 39%. What is so disruptive about moving 20 additional kids out? The school isn't changing, there should be no impact. It is more disruptive splitting these neighborhoods and tearing the kids apart from their friends and the kids with whom they currently ride the bus. Why would we separate neighborhoods and friends because the FARM rate increased from 39% to 40%. Also, what is so different about the 56 kids being moved out of Longfellow vs. the 60 being moved out of Swansfield. The only difference is that the school is larger and therefore the loss of students impacts their FARM rate less. If there is a major concern about the number of FARM students then please send some of the FARM students with us. We would welcome these kids with open arms and will be happy to ride the bus to school with them.

Longfellow is due to be renovated and it has been suggested that they use swing space to accommodate the kids while this renovation happens. I believe the suggested space is the old Faulkner Ridge School. Moving these students would help with fewer portables and less space at Faulkner Ridge would be needed. Also, transporting these kids from Hobbit's Glen to Triadelphia Ridge is not difficult since Harpers Farm turns into Homewood and Folly Quarter Road and then one turn will take you to the school. So, access to the school is as easy or easier than access from 108.

Hobbit's Glen is a diverse community that will add to the diversity of Triadelphia Ridge. Please keep these communities together. These are very diverse communities with more in common than they have different. These kids go to camp together, ride the bus together, compete on the same swim teams and attend the boys and girls scouts together. Please do not leave 20 students out of the redistricting effort so that the FARM rate will be 39% instead of 41%.

An increase in the percentage of FARM students has not stopped the committee in the past and is not stopping the committee this year! Please look at the increases that are in the L7 plan (the last plan with an assessment).

- -HCMS 31% to 33%
- -WLMS 36% to 38%
- -DRES 35% to 40%
- -PLES 46%-51% 76 students moved from Montjoy community to Thunderhill School
- -Steven's Forest 50% 56%

We are also concerned that the FARM percentages that are reported in the assessment don't match what is reported on the school's website. For instance on the PLES website indicates 40.6% FARMS and Longfellow ES indicates 33% FARM rate.

### Text from our association President

"Our homeowners have recently become aware that a new redistricting proposal (Plan L10) has been discussed which will move our community (polygon 1102) from Veterans Elementary to Northfield Elementary. While we understand that in order to balance the enrollment needs of the entire county redistricting is necessary, we respectfully request that our community continue to be served by Veterans Elementary and Ellicott Mills Middle. Our community was a part of the previous redistricting which moved our children from Worthington Elementary to Veterans so we have first-hand experienced how this impacts a community. Despite this our children adopted and have made Veterans Elementary their home. Furthermore, many of our families have developed relationships with families in the Stonecrest, Ellicott Station and Brittany Drive neighborhoods (polygons 3101 and 1101) and we feel strongly that these bonds should not be broken by moving our neighborhood to Northfield Elementary.

While we are pleased that the current plans leave our community in Ellicott Mills Middle, we believe this new elementary redistricting plan creates unreasonable disruption to our families as the majority of the children attending Northfield Elementary will attend Dunloggin Middle School while our children will move on to Ellicott Mills. While making new friends is a part of life, the current proposal seems rather harsh given that this redistricting plan will remove them from the friendships they have developed at Veterans forcing them to make new ones at Northfield only to have these once again broken as they move into middle school. We believe that it is important to maintain the existing feeder pattern that already exists – Veterans to Ellicott Mills to Centennial High. Keeping students together through elementary, middle and high school helps students feel socially established and confident as they approach their important high school years.

In reviewing Plan L10 it appears that this same issue will be experienced by polygon 102 as they are currently assigned to Veterans Elementary only to be sent to Dunloggin Middle while the majority of Veterans moves on to Ellicott Mills. Perhaps one solution to this problem is to move polygon 102 to Northfield Elementary and leave polygon 1102 at Veterans Elementary. This shift would not have an impact on the capacity of either school as the current enrollment of polygon 102 is approximately 33 students
