Schools must be ready for children and families.



Real-life experience

- Take advantage of places in the area to visit!
 - The Howard County Library, hiking trails, zoos, farmer's markets, aquarium, and more.
- These experiences will give your child something to draw upon and relate to during lessons in kindergarten and make the learning more meaningful.
- Children have plenty of opportunity to share "background knowledge" that is, what they already know or have experienced related to a topic.
- Sparks curiosity for new learning

Early vocabulary and literacy exposure

- Back and forth conversation, combined with quality words, supports brain development and helps sets the stage for readiness.
- Use authentic vocabulary related to those real-life experiences.
 - When you visit the grocery store, explain you are buying "golden delicious apples." Discuss what golden and delicious mean. Can you think of or find other things that are golden or delicious? What other words mean the same thing?
- Your lap is the best app! Read real books and give your child a chance to turn the pages, predict what will happen, discuss the story, etc. Point out simple words in the text. Before reading, make predictions about the story. After reading, discuss what happened. Select books and subject-matter of high interest to your child.

Areas of competence and strengths

- There is a developmental continuum across different domains, including Language & Literacy, Mathematics, Social Foundations, Fine and Gross Motor Skills, etc.
- Remember there will be areas of strength and areas of need or emerging skills, and those are unique to every child. Teachers use this approach to support learning and move each child forward along their own unique developmental path.
- Help your child develop additional readiness skills by supporting knowledge, skills, and behaviors that are still emerging and continuing to nurture areas of strength.

Developmentally appropriate activities

- Workbooks and flashcards are not needed to support readiness. Instead, capitalize on your child's interest and their everyday world.
 - Use magnetic letters to spell their name. Practice the names and sounds of the letters in their name. Spell the names of family members and friends. Find other things in the house that start with the same letter as their name.
 - Play with the sounds in words. Change the first letter to a new letter.
 What is the new word?
 - Count the number of steps it takes to get from the car to the front door, the front door to their room. How many rungs on the ladder at the park?
 - And more!

Young, curious minds

- It's ok to ask questions!
- Demonstrate asking questions about things you are curious about. Say things like, "I wonder...". Read books about the things you wonder, visit related places, practice using new words you learn, etc.

Children don't have to come to school knowing everything. It means they have most of the foundational skills, knowledge, and behaviors that help them access new learning.




The Office of Early Childhood Programs strives to ensure that instruction at the kindergarten level:

- supports an individualized approach so each student successfully acquires, demonstrates, and applies the skills and knowledge of the curriculum.






Developmentally Appropriate Practices

- Learning occurs in age-appropriate chunks of time.







Arrival / Morning Work

- Children arrive by car, bus, or as a walker
- Enter with other students
- Learn to participate in arrival routines (e.g., unpack, gather materials) with independence





Opening / Morning Meeting


- Build classroom community
- Talk about the day to come
- Share stories, songs, updates, etc.





Language Arts

- Daily
- Mix of whole group (lessons with the entire class together), small group, partner, and independent opportunities
- Children work in small groups on lessons targeted to meet their individual learning needs.
- Reading, writing, foundational skills, and more!





Science Social Studies Health

- 30-45 minutes, depending on the unit
- Four units per subject
- Specific unit of study for each subject area.

Lunch & Recess


- 30 minutes each
- Lunch available at school or bring from home
- Staff members support children with making choices, opening containers, purchasing, etc.
- Go outside for recess as much as possible, so send children to school in weather-appropriate clothing
- Practice opening containers with your child.





Quiet Time / Take Ten

- Quiet Time is not nap, but a chance to calm after high energy moments.
 - It is important for children to have down time and an opportunity to rest their brains.
- Take Ten is movement, usually set to music. Includes dancing, songs, etc.





Mathematics

- Daily
- Whole group (lessons with the entire class together), small group, partners, and independent opportunities
- Children work in small groups on lessons targeted to meet their individual learning needs.
- Lots of games and hands-on materials like dice, dominoes, animal-shaped counters, etc.







Our Bus Services

Moverd County Public School System (HCPSS) provides safe, resis ble, and efficient transportation to and from school for enrolled students. It ring beyond a one-mile walking distance from elementary and middle achools and a one-and one-half mile walking distance from high schools.

- On the first day, it is recommended to send your child to school the way they will travel every day. Plenty of adults will help guide them and they get to experience the "newness" - and excitement, nerves, anticipation - with their classmates while learning new routines.

All school menus can be accessed through the LINQ Connect parent/guardian portal, on the public-facing LINQ Connect website, or in the mobile app.

Please note, the public-facing LINQ website defaults to display Atholton Elementary. Users can select their child's school by selecting the School box at the top left and choosing their school.

The LINQ Connect online menus additionally display nutritional information, allergens, dietary and religious restrictions, and more. Families with children in more than one school building can easily toggle between buildings via the same screen.

MENUS, NUTRITION & ALLERGIES

Nutritional and Allergen Concerns

All nutritional information for HCPSS meals is available via the LINQ Connect website.

Students with known food allergies (shellfish, tree nuts, gluten, lactose, etc.) must have a formal notice of their allergies from a doctor and submitted to the school nurse. Students who would like to purchase food from the cafeteria can have accommodations made that are suited to their allergies.

MEAL PAYMENTS

Meal Payment

Meal payments may be made via credit card using the LINQ Connect portal. On-site payments and prepayments may be made using cash or check.

Each student is assigned a unique, 6-digit cafeteria PIN, which cashiers can look if a student forgets. This PIN allows HCPSS to receive reimbursements from the National School Lunch Program. Any meals purchased without a PIN will incur an additional charge of \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.60 for lunch.

To request a refund of meal balances at any time, complete this brief.

Unpaid Meal Charges

Parents/guardians are responsible for providing their student(s) with money for meals, or packing a meal from home. If a student forgets or does not have lunch, HCPSS practice is to ensure that no student goes hungry or is traumatized for lack of funds. A meal will be provided and a charge will be applied to the student's meal account. Meals will never be taken away when there are no funds or a negative balance in a student's meal account.



Step 1 – Assess Eligibility and Needs

New Students

Students who have never attended a HCPSS school must be registered by their custodial parent (biological, adoptive, legal guardian).

New Kindergarten Students

Children must be 5 years old by September 1 in order to enroll in kindergarten. Every child who is 5 years old by September 1 must be enrolled in a kindergarten program this fall or have an approved waiver. Please note, 2024-2025 kindergarten waivers will be posted by March 1.

New Prekindergarten Students

HCPSS offers a high-quality, half- or full-day pre-k programs at selected sites. Students must be four years old on or before September 1 to be considered for the program. Unlike enrollment for K-12, parents must first apply and be accepted into the program before beginning online registration.

The early admission process is designed for students who are born between September 2 – October 13 and are seeking enrollment to school one year early.

Step 2 - Find Your School

Parents must live in the attendance area of the school where they plan to enroll their student. Use our School Locator tool to find and verify your school and attendance area.

Step 3 - Gather Documentation

Having all your documentation prepared in advance of registration will keep the process moving quickly. If you have a change of address, please notify your school and complete the Change of Address form.

Student Identification Documentation

- Student's evidence of birth (birth certificate, passport/visa, physician's certificate, baptismal or church certification, hospital certificate, parent/s affidavit or birth registration.)
- Proof of parental relationship, custody, or guardianship. If applicable, bring legal proof of custody (court order).
- Any additional paperwork that may be necessary due to special living arrangements or circumstances.

Academic Documentation

- Student's most recent grade report, transcript, report card from last school attended at time of withdrawal.
- Documentation of Special Education (IEP), 504, Psychological Report, or related services.

Parent Identification Documentation

- Parent picture ID: driver's license, passport, MVA identification or other legal form of photographic identification.
- Signed original, current complete lease or complete deed with your address, valid dates, signatures.
- Current utility bill with name and address (non-cellular telephone, gas and electric, cable bill issued in the last 45 days.)

Health Documentation

Step 5 - Finalize Registration and Meet Your New School

After beginning the registration process online, your child's school will contact you to schedule a virtual meeting to complete the registration process.

- After gathering the required documents, begin the online registration process.
 - Parents/guardians without access to a computer should call their child's designated school for more information.
- Finalize registration with your assigned school. This final step confirms area residency, guardianship of the child and ensures that the registration process is completed correctly.

You will need:

- Picture I.D. (driver's license, passport, MVA identification or other legal form of photographic identification)
- Signed original, current complete lease or deed (to show address, valid dates, signatures)
- Current utility bill with name and address (non-cellular telephone, gas and electric, cable bill issued in the last 45 days.)
- Child's evidence of birth ((birth certificate, passport/visa, physician's certificate, baptismal or church certification, hospital certificate, parent/s affidavit or birth registration)
- Child's current proof of immunizations
- Proof of parental relationship, custody, or guardianship.

Kindergarten Registration Begins March 4-8, 2024

- Children already enrolled in a HCPSS school as a <u>prekindergarten student</u>
 DO NOT need to re-enroll for kindergarten. Parents will receive information from child's current school and records will be transferred.
- If you are buying, building, or leasing a home in another attendance area than where you live, or haven't yet settled on your home, contact Student Reassignment via <u>student_reassignment@hcpss.org</u>.

Kindergarten Registration Begins March 4-8, 2024

If you cannot register March 4-8, that's ok, but you are encouraged to register your child as soon as possible to receive information about upcoming kindergarten transition events, etc.





