All families want what is best for their children.

As a child's first teacher, parents and families play a significant role in education, beginning at birth and beyond.

Going to kindergarten is a developmental milestone. The transition to kindergarten is not a one-time event. Not all children have the same readiness for kindergarten. Schools must be ready for children and families.

Kindergarten is an important step towards success in college, career, and life upon graduation from high school.

Real-life experience

- Take advantage of places in the area to visit!
 - The Howard County Library, hiking trails, zoos, farmer's markets, aquarium, and more.
- These experiences will give your child something to draw upon and relate to during lessons in kindergarten and make the learning more meaningful.
- Children have plenty of opportunity to share "background knowledge" that is, what they already know or have experienced related to a topic.
- Sparks curiosity for new learning and interests

"Ready for School" means... Early vocabulary and literacy exposure

- Back and forth conversation, combined with quality words, supports brain development and helps sets the stage for readiness.
- Use authentic vocabulary related to those real-life experiences and places in the community.
- Some skills related to kindergarten readiness include being able to identify many letters, produce common consonant sounds, and distinguishing sounds at the beginning of words.
- You can support these skills through everyday activities such as grocery shopping, starting with the grocery list. Say the word "apple" slowly. What's the first sound you hear? Help your child write the letter A. When you get to the store, talk about varieties of apples, such as golden delicious. Discuss what golden and delicious mean. Can you think of or find other things that are golden or delicious? What other words mean the same thing?

Early vocabulary and literacy exposure

- Your lap is the best app! Read real books and give your child a chance to turn the pages, predict what will happen, discuss the story, etc. Point out simple words in the text. Before reading, make predictions about the story. After reading, discuss what happened or retell the story. Select books and subject-matter of high interest to your child.
- In kindergarten, children list to stories that take about 15-20 minutes. Reading books with your child is a great way to also help them build stamina and discuss stories.

"Ready for School" means... Areas of competence and strengths

- There is a developmental continuum across different domains, including Language & Literacy, Mathematics, Social Foundations, Fine and Gross Motor Skills, etc.
- Remember there will be areas of strength and areas of need or emerging skills, and those are unique to every child. Teachers use this approach to support learning and move each child forward along their own unique developmental path.
- Help your child develop additional readiness skills by supporting knowledge, skills, and behaviors that are still emerging and continuing to nurture areas of strength.

Developmentally appropriate activities

- Workbooks and flashcards are not needed to support readiness. Instead, capitalize on your child's interest and their everyday world.
- Some skills related to kindergarten readiness include being able to count to 20 or recognize numbers 1-10.
- Support these skills through fun activities that engage multiple senses.
 - For example, take 10 tiny steps and practice saying the numbers in a tiny voice. Then take 10 big steps and say the numbers in a big voice. Work your way up to 20!
 - Another idea is to play Order, Order. Write numbers 1-3 on cards and mix them up. Line up on the other side of the room and have your child race to get the cards and put them in order. Work your way up to 10!

Young, curious minds

- It's ok to ask questions!
- Demonstrate asking questions about things you are curious about. Say things like, "I wonder...". Read books about the things you wonder, visit related places, practice using new words you learn, etc.

Children don't have to come to school knowing everything. It means they have most of the foundational skills, knowledge, and behaviors that help them access new learning.

- Hands-on learning
- Mix of learning preferences: auditory, kinesthetic, visual, etc.
- Manipulatives (magnetic letters, dice, counters, etc.)
- Learning occurs in age-appropriate chunks of time.

- Ability to communicate using language
 - Learning to ask for help
 - Asking questions
 - Back and forth conversation
 - Staying on topic in a conversation
 - Expressing an opinion
 - Etc.



Social Emotional Skill Development

- Skills for life
 - Turn-taking
 - Working memory
 - Ability to control attention
 - Putting off favorite activities to prioritize important tasks

Interdisciplinary Instruction

- Apply subjects and learning across the day
 - Listen to a read aloud about counting in math
 - Write an alphabet book about healthy habits in health
 - Use the Engineering Design Process to create structures in block center during play time
 - Etc.

- Lunch available at school or bring from home
- Staff members support children with making choices, opening containers, purchasing, etc.
- Go outside for recess as much as possible, so send children to school in weather-appropriate clothing
- Practice opening containers, buttoning jackets, and other self-care skills with your child.

Ouiet Time / Take Ten



Quiet Time / Take Ten

- Quiet Time is not nap, but a chance to calm after high energy moments.
 - It is important for children to have down time and an opportunity to rest their brains.
- Take Ten is movement, usually set to music. Includes dancing, songs, etc.

- Daily
- Whole group (lessons with the entire class together), small group, partners, and independent opportunities
- Children work in small groups on lessons targeted to meet their individual learning needs.
- Lots of games and hands-on materials like dice, dominoes, animal-shaped counters, etc.

Getting Ready for Kindergarten

← Back to Enrollment and Registration

Overview

HCPSS kindergarten is a full-day program. Registration for the 2025-2026 school year begins March 3, 2025. Children must be 5 years old by September 1, 2025, in order to enroll in kindergarten. Every eligible child must be enrolled in a kindergarten program this fall or have an approved waiver form. Vaiver forms will be available in March.

Helping Your Child Get Ready for Kind searten

Kindergarten teachers are prepared for children to enter school with varying abilities, strengths and needs. Each child is taught at their appropriate level through differentiated instruction. Learn more what your child will learn in kindergarten.

Prior to kindergarten there are many things parents can do to support their child's transition to school. We recommend attending a <u>Road to</u> <u>Kindergarten parent information session for information about</u> kindergarten readiness, the kindergarten program, and registering your child for school. From making sure appropriate documentation is gathered, to playing with, reading with and listening to their child, the year before kindergarten is a great opportunity to develop school readiness!

Step 1 – Assess Eligibility and Needs

New Students

Students who have never attended a HCPSS school must be registered by their custodial parent (biological, adoptive, legal guardian).

New Kindergarten Students

Children must be 5 years old by September 1 in order to enroll in kindergarten. Every child who is 5 years old by September 1 must be enrolled in a kindergarten program this fall or have an approved waiver.

New Prekindergarten Students

HCPSS offers a high-quality, half- or full-day pre-k programs at selected sites. Students must be four years old on or before September 1 to be considered for the program. Unlike enrollment for K-12, parents must first apply and be accepted into the program before beginning online registration.

Seeking Early Admission?

The early admission process is designed for students who are born between September 2 – October 13 and are seeking enrollment to school one year early.

Step 2 - Find Your School

Parents must live in the attendance area of the school where they plan to enroll their student. Use our School Locator tool to find and verify your school and attendance area.

Step 3 – Gather Documentation

Having all your documentation prepared in advance of registration will keep the process moving quickly. If you have a change of address, please notify your school and complete the Change of Address form.

Student Identification Documentation

- Student's evidence of birth (birth certificate, passport/visa, physician's certificate, baptismal or church certification, hospital certificate, parent/s affidavit or birth registration.)
- Proof of parental relationship, custody, or guardianship. If applicable, bring legal proof of custody (court order).
- Any additional paperwork that may be necessary due to special living arrangements or circumstances.

Academic Documentation

- Student's most recent grade report, transcript, report card from last school attended at time of withdrawal.
- Documentation of Special Education (IEP), 504, Psychological Report, or related services.

Parent Identification Documentation

- Parent picture ID: driver's license, passport, MVA identification or other legal form of photographic identification.
- Signed original, current complete lease or complete deed with your address, valid dates, signatures.
- Current utility bill with name and address (non-cellular telephone, gas and electric, cable bill issued in the last 45 days.)

Health Documentation

- A physical exam form is required for students who have never attended a Maryland Public School, including Prekindergarten and Kindergarten.
- Ar simmunization form is required for students who have never attended a Maryland Public School, including Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten. Proof of immunizations from a Maryland school outside of Howard County can also be used.

Guide to Online Registration for New Students

Kindergarten

Parents/guardians of children who were five as of September 1, 2025, must enroll their children in kindergarten for the 2025-2026 school year.

To register your child for kindergarten, please complete the online registration by selecting the green "Begin Online Registration" button to the left. While completing the online registration form, you can also upload the required documents.

Prekindergarten

Before you can begin the online registration process for the pre-k program, please make sure that you have completed the <u>HCPSS Pre-K</u> <u>Application</u>. Applications are currently being accepted for the 2024-2025 school year. Famililes accepted into the HCPSS Pre-K program will receive an official acceptance letter. This letter is a required piece of the online registration process and should also be used as a point of reference when making pre-k program selections throughout the online registration process.

- After gathering the required documents, begin the online registration process.
 - *Parents/guardians without access to a computer should call their child's designated school for more information.*
- Finalize registration with your assigned school. This final step confirms area residency, guardianship of the child and ensures that the registration process is completed correctly.

Kindergarten Registration Begins March 3-7, 2025

You will need:

- Picture I.D. (driver's license, passport, MVA identification or other legal form of photographic identification)
- Signed original, current complete lease or deed (to show address, valid dates, signatures)
- Current utility bill with name and address (non-cellular telephone, gas and electric, cable bill issued in the last 45 days.)
- Child's evidence of birth (birth certificate, passport/visa, physician's certificate, baptismal or church certification, hospital certificate, parent/s affidavit or birth registration)
- Evidence of immunization and physical examination (completed immunization and physical examination forms).
- Proof of parental relationship, custody, or guardianship.

Kindergarten Registration Begins March 3-7, 2025

- Language support is available through the Multilingual Family Registration Center at 410-313-1297 and 410-313-1525 (Spanish/English).
- Children already enrolled in a HCPSS school as a <u>prekindergarten student</u> (Pre-K, MINC-PK, MINC-EL) **DO NOT** need to re-enroll for kindergarten.
 Parents will receive information from child's current school and records will be transferred.
- If you are buying, building, or leasing a home in another attendance area than where you live, or haven't yet settled on your home, contact Student Reassignment via <u>student_reassignment@hcpss.org</u>.
- For any questions regarding residency, multiple family living arrangements, students experiencing homelessness, or custody/guardianship, please contact the Office of Pupil Personnel at 410-313-6646.

Kindergarten Registration Begins March 3-7, 2025

- If you cannot register March 4-8, that's ok, but you are encouraged to register your child as soon as possible to receive information about upcoming kindergarten transition events, etc.
- After registration kickoff week (March 3-7, 2025), you will need to schedule an appointment with your child's school to finalize the registration process.
